AGRI-CLINIC AND AGRI BUSINESS

- Taken up under Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana to enhance production by way of facilitating farmers through input delivery at grassroot level.
- 10 Agri-Clinic and Agri-Business Centres established in the districts, first initiated during 2017-18.

AGRICULTURE CENSUS

- Being implemented in the State since its inception in 1970-71.
- Conducted quinquennially (after every 5 years) on the recommendation of the National Commission on Agriculture. 2 surveys (i) Agriculture Census Phase I & II and (ii) Input Survey Phase-III as follow up programme. Reference period is the Agriculture Year i.e. from July to next June.
- 10th series of Agriculture Census, 2015-16 as reference year launched in February 2016.
- TISSUE CULTURE LABORATORY AT AGRI-EXPO, DIMAPUR
- Tissue culture technology shows great promise for addressing the issue of genetic erosion as it offers advantage over traditional methods in conserving our bio-diversity.
- The laboratory can play an important role in realizing the goal of Vision 2025, envisaging food security established during 2000-01.
- RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY)
- Initiated during 2007-08 by Gol with the objective to extend support in achieving 4% annual growth rate in agriculture and allied sectors by allowing states to their own agriculture and allied sector development activities, as per the District/State Agriculture Plan.
- Implemented by 8 departments and 3 missions of agriculture and allied sectors. During 2018-19, programme extended to NSAMB and also FOCUS-IFAD convergence.
- AGRI DEVELOPMENT IN CLUSTER BASIS IN PEREN, MOKOKCHUNG AND MON UNDER NEC
- To produce high quality of Lime, Ginger and Turmeric crops to meet the growing demand of consumers, both within and outside the State

as well as in the international markets and to generate income for better and higher standard of living for rural farmers in the districts.

- Covers 750 ha in each district.
- INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT (IPM)
- Organized trainings and demonstrations in 74 Farmer's Field School, each having 30 farmers on paddy, cereals and vegetables and this programme has 2,960 ha.
- State level IPM Refresher Training Course also conducted.
- Rodent Pest Management Training conducted in all the districts and sub-divisions.
- Input support such as IPM kits and rodenticides distributed to the farmers.
- SOIL HEALTH CARD (SHC)
- Launched in 2015, the Government issues SHC to farmers which will carry crop wise recommendations of nutrients and fertilizers, required for the individual farms to help farmers improve productivity through judicious use of inputs.
- The target for 2nd year, 2018-19 was 12,498 soil samples. Target achieved was 20,000 soil samples and 19,155 SHCs distributed in 2017-18.
- The soil samples collected from the districts and sub-divisions are analysed by a company, Octopus Services from Vadodara, and stationed at the Soil Testing Laboratory, Medziphema which also distributed the SHCs.
- DEVELOPMENT OF MOBILE APPS UNDER NATIONAL E-GOVERNANCE PLAN IN AGRICULTURE (NeGP-A):
- Developed 3 Mobile Apps, namely 1) Nagaland Local Plant 2) Naga Farm Doctor 3) Agrilan. (Department website www.agriculture. nagaland.gov.in).
- > 2 more apps are in the pipeline.
- NATIONAL FOOD SECURITY MISSION (NFSM)
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme launched in October 2007, consists of 5 components, namely NFSM-Rice; NFSM-Pulses; NFM-Cereal; Nutri Cereals; and NFSM-Commercial Crops.

WOMEN IN AGRICULTURE

- Under Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana, to empower women through knowledge and skill development, conducted through the Self Help Groups (SHG), consisting of 15-20 members in each SHG. During 2018-19, 30 SHGs were mobilized.
- Training and demonstration conducted include vermi-composting; ginger cultivation; oyster mushroom cultivation; book keeping; water pest and disease management; preparation of nursery; artificial flower making; application of bio-fertilizers; preparation of dishwash etc.
- FARM MACHINERY DISTRIBUTION PROGRAMME: Launched in the State in 2018, distributed 258 power tillers and 53 brush cutters, free of cost to farmers.

AGRO SERVICING CENTRE

- The Department has sent 22 uneducated unemployed from all the districts to NEFMTTI, Bishwanath Chairali Sonbitpur, Assam; VST Training Centre Morigaon, Assam; and Shrachi BTL EPC Ltd. Guwahati, Assam.
- Financial assistance will be provided to those candidates who complete the course successfully, for opening up of Agro Servicing Centres in their respective districts under Flexi Fund of the SMAM, 2017-18.
- AGRICULTURE LINK ROADS
- 81 Rural Road (Agricultural Link Road) Projects sanctioned by NABARD, under RIDF-XIX.
- Target proposed is 290.30 Km, including culverts with a sanctioned amount of Rs. 3,831.20 lakh.
- > 95% of the work completed.
- SUB-MISSION ON SEEDS AND PLANTING MATERIALS (SMSP)
- Implemented in the State since 2014-15.
- > 86 Seed Villages covered during 2018-19.
- Crops taken up in Kharif and Rabi were Rajmah and Mustard.
- SOIL CHEMISTRY LABORATORY, MEDZIPHEMA
- Established at IETC, Medziphema in 1976.
- 19,155 samples analysed and Soil Health Cards issued during 2017-18,.

- BIO-CONTROL LABORATORY, MEDZIPHEMA: Established in 2000, its main purpose is the mass production and multiplication of bioagents.
- **BIO-FERTILIZER LABORATORY, MEDZIPHEMA**: Established in 2002, since then it has produced 175 MT of Rhizobium for pulses, Azotobacter and Azospirillum for cereals, oilseeds, vegetable etc. and Phosphotika which is used for all crops.
- SEED TESTING LABORATORY, DIMAPUR
- Established during 2006, to perform seed testing on all crops, both Kharif and Rabi so as to provide good quality seeds, genetically pure and healthy viable seeds to the farmers.
- Seed testing capacity is 5,000 samples per annum.
- FARM MECHANIZATION (SUB-MISSION ON AGRICULTURE MECHANIZATION)
- Set up and inaugurated 22 Agro Service Centres (ASC) all over the State during 2017-18.
- During 2018-19, the Department distributed 65 power tillers and 195 brush cutters (through Direct Transfer Benefit); and 47 tractors, 862 power tillers, 75 paddy threshers, 1,895 brush cutters and 500 tool sets (free distribution).
- AGRICULTURE TECHNOLOGY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (ATMA) SCHEME OF SUB-MISSION ON AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION (SAME) UNDER NATIONAL MISSION FOR AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION & TECHNOLOGY (NMAET)

- > Aims to boost the production of oilseeds in the country.
- NFSM (OILSEEDS): The diverse agro-ecological condition in the State is favourable for growing 8 annual oilseed crops, which include 6 edible oilseeds (Groundnut, Rapeseed, Mustard, Soyabean, Sunflower, Sesame) and 1 non-edible oilseed (Linseed). Oilseed cultivation is undertaken across the State in about 68.52 thousand ha mainly on marginal lands, which is mainly rainfed farming, and the domestic consumption of edible oil is likely to increase with per capita consumption of vegetable oil at the rate of 16 Kg/year/person.
- NFSM (OIL PALM): Oil palm is comparatively a new crop in India and is the highest edible oil yielding perennial crop.

SEED PRODUCTION

- Sub-scheme of Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana which covers the seed multiplication chain for quality seed supply.
- Main crops taken up during 2018-19 were Potato and Soyabean. 70.6 MT of Potato and 25.032 MT of Soyabean were procured and distributed to the farmers covering 28.24 ha and 226.66 ha, with an anticipated production of 25.032 MT and 317.324 MT respectively.
- PRADHAN MANTRI KRISHI SINCHAYEE YOJANA (PMKSY), 'PER DROP MORE CROP'
- Motto is 'Har Khet Ko Paani.'
- Launched in the State during 2015-16, initially for preparation of District Irrigation Plan (DIP) and State Irrigation Plan (SIP).
- During 2018-19, 45 cluster for the entire State with a proposed area of 2,444 ha.
- RAINFED AREA DEVELOPMENT (RAD) UNDER NMSA
- One of the components of National Mission for Sustainable Agriculture (NMSA), launched in the State during 2014-15, with the main objective of sustainable production, remunerative and climate resilient, conserve natural resources with optimize utilization of water 'Per Drop More Crop.'
- During 2018-19, 55 clusters selected covering all the districts with total area of 2,800 ha. An area of 2,785 ha has been proposed.
- STATE AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH STATION (SARS)

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY & VETERINARY SERVICES

- Under the umbrella of the Department, there are 2 semi-autonomous bodies, namely Nagaland State Dairy Cooperative Federation (NSDCF) and Nagaland Livestock Development Board (NLDB) which are designated at State Implementing Agencies (SIA) and can tap funds from various Ministries for the State for development of Dairy and Livestock Breeding.
- **PRESENT STATUS:** As per the Sample Survey Report of 2017-18, the State produces 45.23% of the total requirement worth Rs. 1,506.15 crore, leaving a shortfall of 54.77%. Out of this shortfall, the State imported animal husbandry products worth Rs. 212.05 crore in monetary terms as shown:

ANIMAL HEALTH

- 55 Dispensaries, 100 Veterinary Health Centres and 16 functional QCPs.
- During 2018-19, under State Plan, the Department has earmarked for construction and strengthening of 2 hospitals and 4 dispensaries and preliminary works are in progress.

ASSISTANCE TO STATE FOR CONTROL OF ANIMAL DISEASE

- Centrally Sponsored Schemes on 90% basis, a merger of former 3 schemes of GoI, namely Foot & Mouth Disease Control Programme; Systematic Control of Animal Disease; and Animal Disease Surveillance Programme.
- During 2017-18, 15,800 bovine population; 4,391 caprine population; and 26,869 population etc. were vaccinated against HSBQ, Canine Rabies, Enterotoxaemia respectively.
- NATIONAL PROGRAMME ON CLASSICAL SWINE FEVER CONTROL
- From 2014-15, it got detached from Assistance to State for Control of Animal Disease (ASCAD) and from 2015-16, the Department is availing it from Gol on 90:10 basis.
- 2,17,620 doses of Swine Fever Vaccine procured and vaccinated against Pig population across the State during 2017-18.
- FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAMME (FMD-CP)
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme aimed at controlling Foot & Mouth Disease in bovine species, particularly in Cattle, Buffaloes and Mithun.
- In 2018-19, 2.46 lakh doses are being targeted to be vaccinated twice annually.
- PESTE DES PETITS RUMINANTS -CONTROL PROGRAMME (PPR-CP)
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme on 90% basis. Initiated during 2014, it aims to vaccinate all the Sheeps and Goats in the State.

- Centrally Sponsored Scheme on 90% basis, this disease is a reemerging zoonotic disease affecting cattle and human beings who are engaged in livestock farming.
- In 2018-19, 30,000 population of eligible Cows are proposed to be vaccinated.
- ESTABLISHMENT AND STRENGTHENING OF VETERINARY HOSPITALS & DISPENSARIES (ESVHD)
- > 90% Centrally Sponsored Scheme programme.
- > During 2018-19, Gol earmarked Rs. 30 lakh for strengthening of

Veterinary Hospitals and Dispensaries in the State with special preference to Kiphire district.

BOVINE DEVELOPMENT

- The Department is focusing on the development of superior cattle through propagation of high yielding cross-bred by adopting Artificial Insemination, using frozen semen imported from the USA.
- Cattle Breeding Farms at Lerie, Aliba, Tuensang and Jalukie including the upcoming farm at Pfütsero where civil work is in progress.

POULTRY DEVELOPMENT

- 9 functional poultry farms which are supplying quality LIT chicks of 1 month old to interested farms at subsidized rate.
- Under National Livestock Mission (NLM), strengthening of State Poultry Breeding Farm at Zunheboto is in the pipeline and Innovative Poultry Productivity Project was implemented in Zunheboto and Mokokchung, where 60,000 LIT birds provided to 300 progressive farmers.

PIGGERY DEVELOPMENT

- 10 functional pig farms from which the cross-bred piglets are made available to the farmers for their parent stock.
- Under the National Livestock Mission (NLM), strengthening of 3 State Pig Breeding Farms at Medziphema, Akuluto and Merangkong, by way of repair and renovation, procurement of elite breeding stock and health coverage.
- Establishment of Rural Pig Slaughter House in 6 urban towns taken up.
- SMALL ANIMAL DEVELOPMENT: During 2017-18, under NLM, construction of 2 rabbit sheds is in progress with a view to strengthen the existing farm at Medziphema so as to produce sufficient quality for farmers.
- FODDER DEVELOPMENT: In 2017-18, fodder production from Non-Forest Wasteland, 200 ha of land is being rehabilitated for increasing production of palatable grasses, biomass and creation of surplus reserves for use in lean period through distribution and cultivation of hybrid fodder seeds like, Maize-AD, Oats Kent, Sorghum, Cowpea etc. to farmers.

- **RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY):** The Department is implementing 2 components called normal RKVY for production of pork through Piggery Development and Tribal Sub-Plan for Poultry Production. 255 farmers provided with Low Input Technology (LIT) birds, under Tribal Sub-Plan and 57 villages adopted for Piggery Development during 2017-18.
- DAIRY DEVELOPMENT
- Mandated to the Nagaland State Dairy Co-operatives Federation Ltd. (NSDCF), which was set up as a State Apex body during 2002, with a view to replicate the apparent success story of the famous 'Anand Pattern' (AMUL) co-operative dairying, to other potential districts of Nagaland.
- 2 Community Dairy Farms in the process of establishment under State Earmarked Programme during 2018-19.
- ADMINISTRATIVE INVESTIGATION & STATISTICS
- LIVESTOCK CENSUS: 100% Central Sponsored Scheme implemented on All India basis once in every 5 years. Conducted 19th Livestock Census in 2012 and 20th Livestock Census is in progress.
- SAMPLE SURVEY: Centrally Sponsored Scheme conducted annually by collecting data on Major Livestock Product (MLP) particularly meat, milk and eggs. In 2017-18, the provisional figure on State Internal Domestic Products is expected to stand at 32.45 (000 tonne) of meat, 78.46 (000 tonne of milk) and 398.76 lakh of eggs. The import quantum is expected to decline and is expected to be at Rs. 212.05 crore for 2017-18.
- INTERNAL PRODUCT AND IMPORT COST IN THE STATE: During 2017-18, the Import Cost was Rs. 212.051 crore and Internal Product was Rs. 1,206.15 crore.

BORDER AFFAIRS

- The main function of the Department is to study the historical facts, records; collect, and compile old records/documents and maps on border areas; and to appear before any court or commission in regard to border related issues. Towards this, the Department has brought out the 'Record Repository-cum-Library' containing rare books, documents and maps of great importance and sensitive in nature are preserved and maintained.
- THE DIRECTORATE OF BORDER AFFAIRS WAS CREATED WITH THE FOLLOWING FUNCTIONS AND OBJECTIVES:
- To look after the Inter-State border disputes and other related problems with neighbouring states of Assam, Arunachal Pradesh and Manipur.
- > To look after the maintenance of Indo-Myanmar boundary pillars adjoining the State under the supervision and directive of the Gol.
- To co-ordinate with various developmental agencies of the Government in carrying out plans, schemes and programmes along the Inter-State and Inter-National border areas.
- Collection and compilation of old records, documents and maps on the border areas and preparation of history sheet of the boundary disputes.
- Maintenance of peace and promotion of sense of security amongst the inhabitants of the border areas.
- At present, the Department is primarily confined to Assam-Nagaland boundary issue which is sub-judiced in the Supreme Court of India on the basis of a Civil Suit filed by the Government of Assam in 1988.
- Altogether, 44 Affidavit of Witnesses for the State of Nagaland has been filed in the Supreme Court of India.
- During the year, the Department officials along with the Legal Consultant provided district wise orientation to all the witnesses. Towards this end, Rs. 130 lakh is earmarked for payment of Legal Fee to Advocates and Supreme Court related expenditure during 2018-2019.

- In order to maintain peace and tranquility in the disputed border areas, Border Peace Co-ordination Committee (BPCC) has been formed in all the districts bordering Assam comprising of representative from both the states. To create conducive atmosphere for maintaining peace and harmony among the people of Nagaland and Assam, culture and sports programmes are being organized in almost all the sectors of the disputed border areas.
- Apart from the main duties and function, the Department also undertakes minor developmental works to provide basic amenities to the Naga villages in the border areas.
- The Department has started providing basic minimum infrastructure in the disputed border areas like Border Magistrate Office Building, Staff Quarters, Border Rest House, drinking water and road connectivity. These civil works are being executed by the Executive Engineers, CAWD, under Commissioner's Establishment and monitored by the Department of Border Affairs. Rs. 100 lakh is earmarked during 2018-19 for construction of staff quarter at Kohima and road connectivity in the border areas.
- To ensure better co-ordination and effective monitoring of the border areas especially in the Assam-Nagaland border, regular border meetings are being held at different level from Chief Minister down to Border Magistrate from time to time.

- DOVETAILING OF ICDP WITH NSTFDC: Reducing the rate of interest from 10.35% to 9%. w.e.f. 31.12.2018, to be paid to NCDC in regard to the ongoing ICDP project in 5 districts of Kohima, Tuensang, Longleng, Kiphire and Peren.
- RECOVERY DRIVE: Government has approved a One Time Settlement (OTS) scheme on 17th December 2018 with the initiative to encourage the defaulting Co-operative Societies who has availed loan under CSS on or before 31-12-2007, for clearing of all outstanding loans with the condition to repay 100% principal and 2 years of interest.

- NATIONAL SAMPLE SURVEY (NSS): Serves as a major source of information for formulating comprehensive planning in the country. During 2018-19, the 76th Round of NSS on 'Drinking Water, Sanitation, Hygiene & Housing Condition and Survey of Persons with Disabilities are in progress.

> NUMBER OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS REGISTERED:

- INDEX ON INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION (IIP): Measures the volume of change in the industrial production in the economy. Compiles the State level Indices of Industrial Production (IIP) with base year 2004-2005. This base is under revision to 2011-12. In the new series, 9 items are included, spread across 47 factories.
- **STATISTICAL HANDBOOK:** Reflection of the developmental activities carried out by various departments in the State. These data is available in public domain through the website of the Department www.statistics.nagaland.gov.in. Published Statistical Handbook 2017 and Statistical Handbook 2018 is under finalization for publication.
- HOUSING STATISTICS
- The Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs has selected major cities on a pilot basis including Kohima, Dimapur and Tuensang to collect the Housing and Building Construction Statistics on quarterly basis.
- Collected and uploaded housing statistics from the 3 local bodies for the quarter ending December 2018 to the Ministry's website through BRIKS software for estimating Building Construction Cost Index (BCC). The largest available estimates of BCC Index 2016-17 are 108.31 points.
- During 2017-18, Kohima Municipal Council and Dimapur Municipal Council issued 29 and 68 building construction permits respectively.
- BASIC STATISTICS ON VILLAGE LEVEL DEVELOPMENT INDICATOR (VLDI): Indicates the availability/accessibility of basic amenities in the rural areas published (VLDI) as on 31st March 2016. VLDI report for 2017 and 2018 is under compilation.
- **ECONOMIC SURVEY:** Summarizes the performance of major developmental programmes and highlights the policy initiatives of the Government. The Department placed the first Economic Survey 2014-15 on the floor of the Nagaland Legislative Assembly in 2015. Economic Survey 2015-16 and 2016-17 has been placed in the NLA.
- **ENVIRONMENTAL STATISTICS:** Set up an Environmental Statistics Cell, which collects data on environmental issues, degradation, pollution and climate change in the State in coordination with Environment Cell of Forest Department and Pollution Control Board.
- **GENDER STATISTICS:** First report released during 2017. It focusses on 8 major areas of women's status in Nagaland which includes

population; health; social obstacles in women's empowerment; leadership; women participation in economy; labour force; employment; literacy and education.

- **TRAINING DIVISION:** Conducted in-service training for officers and staff of the Directorate and the District Statistical Officers on office procedures, official statistics, basic computer application etc. Sensitization and orientation programmes also conducted at the grassroot level and institutional registration of births and deaths.
- PHYSICAL ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2018-19
- PUBLICATION: Statistical Handbook 2017; Estimation of State Domestic Product 2011-2012 (New Series); National Sample Survey (NSS) and 69th Round; Important Economic Indicators 2013; Statistical Abstract 2008-2009; Government Employees Census 2014; Economic Survey 2016-17; Election Result Seventh Edition 2013; Annual Report of Births & Deaths 2016; and Basic Statistics for Local Level Development (BSLLD) Rural Areas Report 2016.

- CONDUCT OF ELECTION/BYE-ELECTION TO: The 60 Assembly Constituencies in Nagaland Legislative Assembly; The Ione Lok Sabha seat allocated to Nagaland; The Ione Rajya Sabha seat allocated to Nagaland; and the Office of the President of India.
- PREPARATION OF ELECTORAL ROLLS: Intensive Revision/Annual Summary Revision of Electoral Rolls as announced by the Election Commission of India; Continuous updating of Electoral Rolls; Issue of Electoral Photo Identity Cards (EPICs) to voters; Rationalization / reorganization of polling stations; and Voters' education as per relevant provisions of acts, rules and instructions issued by the Election Commission of India from time to time.
- CONDUCT OF BYE-ELECTION TO THE LOK SABHA, 2018: As per notification issued by the Election Commission of India on 3rd May 2018, bye-election to the Lok Sabha, 2018 for Nagaland Parliamentary Constituency was held on 28th May 2018. The voter percentage turn

out in the bye-election was 85.48 (Male- 86% and Female- 84.94%)

- **POLLING STATIONS:** As approved by the Election Commission of India, there has been an increase in the number of polling stations from 2,196 in 2018 to 2,227 in 2019 as a result of rationalization of polling stations.
- ELECTORAL LITERACY CLUB: Set up to promote electoral literacy for all age group of Indian citizens, especially the future and young voters through interesting and engaging activities and hands-on experiences in all political, neutral and non-partisan manner. Set up at polling station level as 'Chunav Pathshalas.'
- SYSTEMATIC VOTER EDUCATION AND ELECTORAL PARTICIPATION
 (SVEEP)
- Launched by the Election Commission of India in 2010 with the objective of facilitating an enhanced, ethical and informed electoral participation.
- Lays special focus on people from marginalized groups and segments, Persons with Disabilities (PwDs), Third Gender, Service Voters and NRIs besides women and youth.
- Activities include appointment of State Election Icons, Anthems on Clean Elections by the districts, awareness campaign on Voter Verifiable Paper Audit Trail (VVPAT) demonstrations, etc. A Toll Free Helpline 1050 commissioned to get information assistance and awareness, whereby any person can dial the number to get information, assistance and also lodge complaints on election matters.

• NATIONAL VOTER'S DAY (NVD) 2019

- Held on 25th January 2019 all over the State with the theme 'No voter to be left behind.' At the district level, the NVD was organized in 49 centers.
- > 1,466 badges were distributed to the new electors all over the State.
- Awards for different level of competition at state and district level were presented. In the State level, Best Electoral Practices Award, Best Performing AEO of the State, Best BLO and Best Campus Ambassador were awarded.
- For the first time since launching of the Electoral Literacy Clubs (ELCs) in the State, NVD celebrations were organized in educational institutions. 17 schools celebrated NVD through ELC schools.

- As per directives of the ECI, all officers and staff in government departments were directed to take the NVD Pledge for promotion of democratic electoral participation.
- YOUTH VOTERS' FESTIVAL 2018
- Conducted on the 20th and 21st of September 2018 by organizing events such as visit of students to headquarters; Voters Registration & Educational Centre (VREC); Drive for obtaining Pledge Cards on ethical registration from their parents/guardians by future category students and Pledge Cards were submitted to the Office of the CEO.
- Conduct of district-level competitions amongst the students of secondary schools to colleges on election related topic such as essay writing, debate, art & painting and slogan writing were held.

ELECTRICAL INSPECTORATE

- FUNCTIONS: Administration of the provisions of Indian Electricity Acts and Rules; Administration of the provisions of Licensing Board (Electricity) Regulation; Prevention and investigation of electrical accidents and examination of the causes leading to such accidents; and Administration of the provisions of Energy Conservation Act, 2001.
- NAGALAND STATE DESIGNATED AGENCY (NSDA): Develop policies and strategies with thrust on self-regulation and market principles, within the overall framework of the Energy Conservation Act 2001 with the primary objective of reducing energy intensity of the Indian Economy.
- STATE ENERGY CONSERVATION FUND: Energy Saving Plan taken up by the Nagaland State Designated Agency, under the guidance of Bureau of Energy Efficiency and National Productivity Council of India in domestic and building sectors and other related activities. The State Designated Agency has implemented 'Green Village Initiative' taken up demonstration project in 76 villages to showcase and educate the people on energy conservation and its efficient use, beside free distribution of Energy Efficient LED bulb, LED tube, LED streetlight etc. to the villagers.

- REGISTRATION: 22,943 fresh applicants registered at the various employment exchanges for job assistance. Registered number of applicants is 75,046.
- SELF-EMPLOYMENT: Self-Employment Promotion Cell (SEPC) in the Regional Employment Exchange, Kohima co-ordinates selfemployment promotional activities. 1,694 candidates registered, out of which 35 were placed in various self-employment ventures during the current financial year.
- PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED CELL: Established with central assistance merged with the Regional Employment Exchange, Kohima. 1,117 applicants on the Live Register of Employment Exchanges, under Physically Handicapped category.
- EMPLOYMENT MARKET INFORMATION: Under the Employment Exchanges (Compulsory Notification of Vacancies) Act, 1959, the Employment Exchanges are empowered to collect various Employment Statistics from all public and private sectors employing more than 24 persons. The Department collects information from the private sector units employing 10 to 24 persons on voluntary basis.
- ACTIVITIES UNDER SKILL DEVELOPMENT & ENTREPRENEURSHIP

- > CRAFTSMEN TRAINING SCHEME (CTS)
- Imparts skill oriented training to youths, who are mostly college and school drop-out so as to enable them to be absorbed in gainful employment and also to engage them in self-employment ventures.
- 8 Industrial Training Institutes Kohima, Dimapur (Women), Mon, Wokha, Mokokchung, Tuensang, Phek and Zunheboto imparting training in 22 trades (14 engineering and 8 non-engineering).

- APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING PRORAMME: 50 trainees successfully passed the Apprenticeship Exam.

ONGOING SCHEMES

- > CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEME'ENHANCING SKILL DEVELOPMENT INFRASTRUCTURE IN NORTH EAST STATES AND SIKKIM'
- 1. 2 ITIs in the State upgraded by introducing 3 new trades, and 5 ITIs were upgraded by supplementing infrastructure deficiencies such as hostel facilities, boundary walls, machineries, equipments, furniture and hand tool instruments for 3 existing trades.
- 2 new ITIs at Dimapur and Peren are presently under construction. Proposal for establishment of 2 new ITIs in Longleng and Kiphire is under submission.

- 1. The Department collaborated with premier industries like Indigo Airlines, Spice Jet, Jet Airways, The Oberoi, Maruti Suzuki etc. for direct recruitment of youths.
- 2. 50 youths recruited in various capacities as cabin crew, ground operation officer, service advisor and service technician.

> PRADHAN MANTRI KAUSHAL VIKAS YOJANA (PMKVY) STATE MANAGED COMPONENT

- Flagship scheme of the Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship (MSDE), objective of this Skill Certificate Scheme is to enable youths to take up industry relevant skill training that will help them in securing a better livelihood.
- 2. The State has been provided a target to train 33,021 youths across multiples sectors in various jobs.

- 3. Scheme was rolled out in the State during July 2018 and till date, 641 youths have been trained. Currently, 585 youths are undergoing training in various training centers across the country.
- SKILLS COMPETITION: The India Skills Competition, Nagaland 2018 edition for Cooking and Confectionery/Patisserie skills was held in April 2018 with 27 participants under the age of 21, registered for the competition. The winners and runners-up of both the category represented the State in the Regional Competitions held at Bhubaneswar, Odisha in July 2018.
- MoU WITH UNITED STATES INDIA BUSINESS COUNCIL (USIBC): To facilitate engagements within Nagaland in which the corporate entities can present their interests, advice and capabilities in several areas such as development of an employment-oriented skill ecosystem, preparation of a blueprint of skill development for employability and also assist finding partners to implement it in Nagaland.
- SKILL MELA 2018, KIPHIRE: Conducted an awareness generation campaign on Skill Development for livelihood generation under the aegis 'Skill Mela 2018 Kiphire' in June.

- PURCHASED FORESTS: Since the area under Government forests in the State is limited, the Department has purchased some forest land from private owners to take up plantations and biodiversity conservation.
- RECORDED FOREST AREA: 8,629.30 Sq. Km which is 52% of its geographical area. The Reserved Forests constitutes 3.06%, Protected Forests 5.51% and Unclassed Forests 93.56%.
- PROTECTED AREA: Nagaland has 1 National Park and 3 Wildlife Sanctuaries covering 222 Sq. Km which constitutes 1.34 % of the State's geographical area.
- FOREST COVER: 12,489 Sq. Km, which is 75.33% of the State's geographical area. In terms of forest canopy density classes, the State has 1,279 Sq. Km under Very Dense Forest, 4,587 Sq. Km under Moderately Dense Forest and 6,623 Sq. Km under Open Forest.

> DISTRICT-WISE FOREST COVER (AREA IN SQ. KM):

- LAND PURCHASED FOR NPPC, TULI: Department purchased lands measuring 12,712.024 ha in different years, for raising bamboo plantation for supply of raw material to NPPC, Tuli.
- FOREST TYPES IN NAGALAND: Forest types found in the State (as per classification by Champion & Seth).
- 1. NORTHERN TROPICAL WET EVERGREEN FOREST (IB): Once covered the Namsa-Tizit area but now only a small vestige is found in the Zankam area. Found only in Mon district, dominant species are Hollong (Dipterocarpus Macrocarpus), Makai (Shorea Assmica), Nahor (Mesua Ferrea) etc.
- 2. NORTHERN TROPICAL SEMI EVERGREEN FOREST (2B): Found in the foothills of Assam-Nagaland border in Mokokchung, Wokha and Kohima districts similar to those of the Northern Tropical Wet Evergreen Forests. The only difference is that in the former case, the evergreen species dominate though there are deciduous species like Bhelu (Tetrameles Nudiflora), Paroli (Stereospesrmum Chelonoides), Jutuli (Altingia Excelsa) etc. whereas in the present case, the number of evergreen species decreases and the deciduous species are more in number.
- 3. NORTHERN SUB-TROPICAL BROAD LEAVED WET HILL FOREST (8B/C1): Found in the hill areas below 1,800m and above 500m in all the districts. Important timber species in this type are Koroi (Abelmoschus), Pomas (Chukrasia), Sobas (Magnolia), Gamari (Gmelina), Hollock (Terminalia), Sam (Betula Nigra), Aam (Mangifera), Badam (Prunus), Betula etc.
- 4. NORTHERN SUB-TROPICAL PINE FOREST (9/C2): Found in hills with elevation of 1,000m to 1,500m in parts of Phek and Tuensang districts. Pine is the dominant species, and is found mixed with Quercus, Schima, Prunus, Betula and Rhododendron.
- NORTHERN MONTANE WET TEMPERATE FOREST (11B): Found on the higher reaches of the tallest mountain (above 2,500m) like Saramati and Dzükou area. Species that dominate are Rhododendron Oaks (Quercus), Birch and Juniperus sp.
- 6. ALPINE FOREST (15): Found at high altitudes in ridges of Saramati range. Species of Rhododendron, Abies, and Juniperus are found in sub-alpine vegetation and gradually merges into alpine vegetation which comprises of high altitude grasses and dwarf Rhododendrons.

- MANAGEMENT OF FORESTS
- > JOINT FOREST MANAGEMENT (JFM)
- 1. **OBJECTIVES OF JFM**: To elicit active participation of villagers in (i) creation (ii) management and (iii) protection of plantations; To achieve ecological needs consonant with sustainable productive forestry; and to create a wood-based economy for the people.
- 2. AREAS TO BE COVERED: Non-governmental lands that can be put into use for forestry; Non-governmental virgin forests; and any other land of the State, which may be managed under JFM.
- FORESTRY RESEARCH
- SILVICULTURE DIVISION: Created in 1975, with headquarters at Kohima. 3 ranges namely Silviculture Range, Kohima; Silviculture Range, Dimapur; Silviculture Range, Mokokchung.
- BOTANICAL GARDEN: Area of 8.3475 ha at Kohima which is rich in biodiversity with the presence of rare and endangered species. Aims to act as a center of excellence for education, research, training and cater to the conservation needs of rare and threatened endangered species; Reintroduce, conserve and propagate the values of plants and its indigenous knowledge.
- NURSERY: Silviculture division maintains a Central Nursery at Kohima, while Dimapur Range and Mokokchung Range also maintains a nursery to cater to the seedling requirement for plantation by educational institutions, government institutions, NGOs, SHGs and others. Has successfully propagated Gingko Biloba and Weeping Willow through branch cutting.
- > PLANT TISSUE CULTURE
- 1. Collection of techniques used to maintain or grow plant cells, tissues or organs under sterile conditions on a nutrient culture medium of known composition.
- 2. Plant Tissue Culture Laboratory was established in 2016, under the Silviculture Division Kohima, under which research activities are being carried out in raising tissue culture plants of 2 trees species, namely Dipterocarpus Macrocarpus and Duabanga Grandiflora.

WILDLIFE CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT:

- COMMUNITY RESERVES: The State Government notified 57 Community Reserves in 2018-19.
- CAPTIVE ANIMALS: The erstwhile Kohima Zoo was shifted to Dimapur and the Nagaland Zoological Park, Rangapahar was established in 2008. Population of captive animals was 50 and the present population is 333, with species.
- CONSERVATION BREEDING: Conservation breeding in Oriented Pine Hornbill and Burmese Tortoise has been successful and conservation breeding of Blyth's Tragopan was observed in 2016 at the Tragopan Conservation Breeding Centre, Kohima.
- > ACTIVITIES
- HUMAN ANIMAL CONFLICT MITIGATION AWARENESS CAMPAIGN: Organized in all 11 District Headquarters, with participation of officials from the MoEF, District Administration, Village Councils, farmers, students and other stakeholders.
- 2. NATURE LEARNING CENTRE UNDER NATIONAL MISSION OF HIMALAYAN STUDIES (NMHS): 15 Community Reserves sanctioned in Annual Plan of Operation in 2017-18. Awareness programme on Protection and Conservation of Forest & Wildlife Nature Conservation was organized by the Wildlife wing of the Department in all 15 Community Reserves which were spread over different parts of the State for communities and school children of nearby villages.

- **3. PROJECT TIGER:** The National Tiger Conservation Authority, Ministry of Environment, Forests & Climate Change, Gol, New Delhi recognized potential of tiger population in Intangki National Park, Singphan Wildlife Sanctuary and Fakim Wildlife Sanctuary. Fund has been sanctioned by the authority for tiger estimation.
- SINGPHAN ELEPHANT RESERVE: On approval of the Environment, Forests & Climate Change, Gol, New Delhi, the Government of Nagaland, vide Notification dated June 2018 declared the Singphan Elephant Reserve.
- 5. COMMUNITY RESERVE FORESTS: Various wildlife habitat enrichment activities were carried out such as construction/creation of waterholes, saltlicks, planting of fruits trees species etc. for wild animals and birds as wildlife requires sufficient water, food, shelter and space to survive. Alternative livelihood measures such as distribution of piglets and poultry are carried out to reduce people's dependence on forests and wildlife for animal protein. Besides these, watchtowers/lookout towers were also constructed to check poaching, illegal logging, fire etc.
- 6. WILDLIFE CRIMES: The Wildlife Crime Control Branch, Wildlife Division, Dimapur conducting regular and surprise raid in all the market areas of the town, engaging informers in each of the sensitive areas/locations/points /places in and around Dimapur, so as to get first hand information on wildlife crimes. Also mobile patrolling team to respond to any emergency duty and conducts patrolling duty along the Dimapur-Kohima Highway. Hunting (killing, poisoning, capturing, snaring, coursing, trapping, driving, baiting, injuring, destroying and damaging or disturbing eggs or nest) of wildlife is a punishable offence as per the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. The crime against wildlife invites penalty or fine up to Rs. 25,000/- or imprisonment up to 7 years or both. Various assistance to villages under whose jurisdiction the wildlife offences are detected will be curtailed.

- COMMUNITY CONSERVATION: 407 documented Community Conserved Areas (CCAs), out of which 343 CCAs constituting 84.3% are self-initiated and 62 CCAs (15.2%) are initiated by Department.
- FOREST PLANTATION
- Mostly as Micro-Projects, in a minimum compact area of 30 ha. The plantation area is then divided into Annual Coupes (Annual plantation Area) depending on the extent of the area, so that the Micro-Project area is planted up within 3 years. As the State Government has adopted the Joint Forest Management (JFM) resolution, all new plantations are taken up under the concept of JFM only.
- National Afforestation and Eco-development Board has brought Integrated Afforestation and Eco-development project. Non-Timber Forest Produce Area Oriented Fuel-wood and Fodder Programme, Association of Tribal & Rural Poor in Regeneration of Degraded Forests under National Afforestation Programme. These schemes have been operational through the Forest Development Agency (FDA) by forming the Village Forest Committees (VFCs).
- At present, the FDAs are operational in all Territorial Divisions including Social Forestry Division, Kohima.

> NATIONAL AFFORESTATION PROGRAMME (NAP)

- 1. Prime objective is to ensure them by 2012. One-third geographical area of the country shall be under tree cover.
- Objectives of NAP are effective utilization of jhum land; Ensure supply of fuel wood and small timber; Checking of land erosion through soil conservation measures; and conservation and promotion of nontimber forests produces etc.
- FOREST DEVELOPMENT AGENCY (FDA): Constituted under National Afforestation Programme (NAP) and registered under Registration of Societies Act, 1860. The mode of implementation is on the basis of Joint Forest Management.
- ENTRY POINT ACTIVITIES (EPA): Aims to solicit the support of the people by undertaking the non-forestry works, which are of community usage. Works have been carried out by different FDAs such as Community Hall & Rest Houses; Village Panchayat Hall & Village Court; Approach Road Construction; School Building Construction;

School Bench Supply; LPG Connection, Improved Chula; Rainwater Harvesting Tank & Water Supply; Waiting Shed; and Multipurpose Building & Marketing Shed; Seed Money for Self Help Group (SHG) to establish poultry, piggery, floriculture, fishery, weaving units etc.

• **REVENUE:** During 2018-19, the Department generated revenue of Rs. 491.02 lakh (as on 31st December 2018).

EXCISE & PROHIBITION

• **FUNCTION:** The main function is now shifted from revenue collection and regulatory role to enforcement of the Nagaland Liquor Total Prohibition Act 1989 in the State, mainly focused on preventive measures, and control of possession, sale, consumption, manufacture and transportation of liquor and smuggling of excisable goods and other narcotic drugs in the State. It also procures and supplies opium

to recognized/registered addicts, regulates denatured spirit for industrial purpose, control of molasses and also to co-ordinate with central agencies like NCB and Central Bureau of Narcotics etc.

- CSD/BONDED WAREHOUSES: The Department also controls and regulates the import, export and issue of liquor to military and para military units through Canteen Stores Depot (1) and Para-Military Bonded Warehouses (2) located at Dimapur.

FINANCE

- The Department exercises administrative control and supervision over the 3 Directorates of Taxes, Treasuries & Accounts, and Nagaland State Lotteries.
- Comprises of 10 branches, namely Establishment & ROP Cell, Revenue, Treasuries & Accounts, Lottery Branch, Computer Cell, Budget & Monitoring Cell, Finance Commission Research Cells, General Branch, Expenditure 'A,' and Expenditure 'B.'
- 1. COMMISSIONERATE OF STATE TAXES
- MOBILE SQUAD: Functions as the intelligence wing of the Department and maintains vigil over the business activities of the traders to prevent tax evasion. It also conducts searches and seizures and investigates cases of tax evasion on assignment by the Commissioner, as well as on its own initiative and reports to the Commissioner.
- **ZONAL OFFICES:** Divided into 3 zones, namely Dimapur Zone covering Dimapur, Mon, and Peren districts; Kohima Zone covering Kohima, Phek and Wokha districts; Mokokchung zone covering Mokokchung, Kiphire, Longleng, Tuensang and Zunheboto districts.

• NEW INITIATIVES DURING THE CURRENT FINANCIAL YEAR

- > IMPLEMENTATION OF GOODS AND SERVICE TAX (GST) IN THE STATE
- 1. Introduced and implemented the Nagaland Goods & Services Tax Act, 2017 with effect from 1st July 2017.
- REVENUE: The Department has further streamlined the various tax series like issuance of statutory form, filing of returns and payment process etc. These services can be accessed anytime through the Department's web-portal www.nagalandtax.nic.in
- 3. The Department is already in the process of developing application modules for Processions Tax.

4. IMPACT OF GST FOR NAGALAND

- A. GST WILL REDUCE TAX EVASION: There will be seamless chain of Input Tax Credit from manufacturers to the distributors and this facility will be made available only to the registered dealers.
- B. PROPORTIONATE DISTRIBUTION OF REVENUE AMONG THE STATES: Under the VAT regime, the manufacturing states get extra amount of tax revenue in the form of CST besides VAT. However, under the GST, every state will get the proportionate amount of tax according to their consumption.
- C. **SUPPORT TO BUSINESS:** Tax structure under GST will be equal in all states. There will be no location bias so far as the tax administration is concerned.

2. DIRECTORATE OF TREASURIES & ACCOUNTS

- 11 District Treasuries and 12 Sub-Treasuries of Tseminyu, Mangkolemba, Pfütsero, Chazouba, Longleng and Aghunato have become banking Sub-Treasuries.
- The Department carries out Internal Audit of all the departments of the Government, local bodies and private institutions that receive government grants. These agencies serve as financial advisors and guide to the Heads of Departments (HoDs) and the Drawing & Disbursing Officers (DDOs).
- DUTIES OF THE DIRECTORATE: Looks after the cadre control of all non-gazetted staff, monitoring of expenditure of all departments, monitoring and regulation of expenditure on GPF; Authentication of Drawal Authorities/Drawing Limits; Overall supervision of the working of Treasuries and Sub-Treasuries; and all service matters of both gazetted and non-gazetted staff of the Department. It also carries out pre-audit of all Arrear Bills, M.R. Bills and Leave Encashment Bills of all departments.

- TRAINING: The Department Training Institute at Purana Bazar, Dimapur imparts training as per the prescribed syllabus to in-service staff and officers of the Department throughout the year. Conducted short term Refresher Course for 44 participants (Senior Divisional Accountants - 19; Treasury Accountants - 6; Divisional Account Officers - 11; and STO/JAO - 8 participants) and for long term course for NPSC Recruits 2018-19, 17 Junior Divisional Accountants are undergoing the training.
- **MONITORING CELL:** Monitors the DDO-wise expenditure of all departments on the basis of monthly monitoring reports received from various Treasuries and Sub-Treasuries. These reports are compiled in the Directorate and submitted to the Finance Department.

3. DIRECTORATE OF NAGALAND STATE LOTTERIES

• With the introduction of the Lotteries (Regulation) Rules, 2010 framed by the Ministry of Home Affairs, New Delhi, the scope of lottery trade and earnings have been enhanced to a great extent.

• With a view to supplement the revenue of the State, Government of Nagaland has passed the Nagaland Prohibition of Gambling and Promotion & Regulations of Online Games of Skills Act, 2015 and Rules 2016. The Department has so far issued license of Online Games of Skill to 11 firms w.e.f. December 2016 onwards. License is issued for 5 years which may be renewed annually subject to compliance of prescribed conditions.

NATURE OF WORK AND ACTIVITIES

- > To conduct/monitor the lottery draws through the distributors appointed by the Government from time to time.
- Maintains daily records of sales, examines the lottery schemes submitted by distributors, makes assessment of markets, places orders for print of lottery tickets to Security Printers, keeps records of tickets printed, processes and releases prize money, monitors government revenue, etc.

- ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2018-19: During 2018-19, a divisible amount of Rs. 100 lakh with an additional amount of Rs. 252.04 lakh under NABARD and HUDCO and Rs. 594.975 lakh under C.S.S./NEC/ State share adding up to Rs. 947.015 lakh was allocated to implement various schemes:
 - The Department under Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) scheme embarked on activities such as development of derelict water bodies, development of paddy-cum-fish culture, capacity building and upgradation and development of carp hatchery and fish seed rearing unit in the State.

- 'Blue Revolution- Integrated Development and Management of Fisheries' initiated in 2016-17, successfully pursued.
- To improve and provide hygienic stalls/cabins to fish vendors, the Department established 59 fish kiosks successfully, initiated in 2014-15 for 3 years, under Negotiated Loan (NABARD).

STATE PLAN SCHEMES

- INTEGRATED FISH FARMING: Integrating fish culture in wet terrace paddy fields and rearing livestock is gaining momentum.
- PADDY-CUM-FISH CULTURE: Gradually picking up in the State with the adoption and perfection in the culture system by providing strong dykes/semi-permanent embankments. The new venture has enhanced fish production by augmenting the productivity level from 3,560 Kg/ha to 500 Kg/ha.

> FISH AND FISH SEED PRODUCTION

- 1. FISH FARM CONSTRUCTION: Primary consideration is setting up of a farm/production centre having basic minimum facilities; good quality water retentive soil; adequate water source; all weather road etc.
- ASSISTANCE TO PISCICULTURIST: Supply/distribution of fast growing compatible major carp seeds at 50% subsidized rates. During 2018-19, Rs. 30 lakh was incurred for successful implementation.
- A. Compatible Prawn Seeds (Post Larvae) produced through artificial seawater in vitro conditions at Nathanglu Prawn Hatchery, Mokokchung successfully propagated and Rs. 5 lakh earmarked for breeding of prawn seeds.
- B. The Department carried out induced breeding programme for which Rs. 5 lakh has been earmarked.
- WOMEN EMPOWERMENT/ DEVELOPMENT (GENDER BUDGETING): The Department emphasize on integrating women in fish farming by organizing awareness programmes/capacity building and assisting the grassroot women as economic Self Help Groups (SHGs) in providing inputs, additional returns/benefits towards pond management. Rs. 5 lakh earmarked to organize sensitization programmes.
- SPORTS FISHERIES: Angling competition is a recent innovation in which individuals compete for prizes based on the total weight of a

given species of fish caught within a predetermined time, and holds a great promise of being a potential employment generating sector. During 2018-19, Rs. 5 lakh earmarked for this activity.

NEGOTIATED LOAN

- To improve and modernize fish kiosk/outlet, the Department proposed to establish 59 modern fish kiosks in 11 districts. Rs. 648.47 lakh was sanctioned by NABARD. The project was phased in 2014-15 under RIDF-XX. During 2018-19, Rs. 66.04 lakh was sanctioned for development of 7 fish kiosks.
- > Rs. 186 lakh was allotted under Negotiated Loan and HUDCO for construction of District Fishery Officer establishment at Kohima.
- CENTRAL PLAN/ CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES
- BLUE REVOLUTION: INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT OF FISHERIES: The Gol envisages to pursue the vision which is easily adaptable and beneficial to the populace of the State.
- NORTH EASTERN COUNCIL SPONSORED SCHEMES: Implemented to boost Integrated Fisheries and Development of Fisheries. During 2018-19, NEC has approved and released Rs. 244.40 lakh against Fishery Project at Molungyimsen, Mokokchung and Fish Seed and Table Fish Production Farm at Ghowoto, Dimapur.
- RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY)-(CENTRAL 100 %): Rs. 247 lakh sanctioned during 2018-19, that implemented the ambitious District Agriculture Plan (DAP) under RKVY for development of derelict water bodies, promotion of farm equipments, paddy-cumfish culture, capacity building and skill upgradation of carp hatchery and fish seed rearing unit.

- A. Detailed geological mapping on 1:5,000 scale of 4.05 Sq. Km involving mapping of lithology structure, coal seams, delineation of coal seam zones and their correlation.
- B. Release of 12 borehole points based on geological mapping.

- 1. During the current FSP, the field works for all the parameters were completed for about one-third of the study area covering North-West of Dimapur.
- 2. During the FSP 2018-19, thematic mapping for another one-third of the city i.e. East Dimapur will be carried out.
- MINERAL DEVELOPMENT: IMPLEMENTATION OF NAGALAND COAL POLICY AND REVENUE COLLECTION
- MINING LICENSE: Has issued about 6 coal mining lease and 5 Small Pocket Deposit license during 2018 till date.
- MINERAL CHECK-GATE AND DEPLOYMENT OF MANPOWER: 19 check gates set up to regulate and control revenue from coal sector in coal bearing districts and accordingly deployed 5 District Officers, 8 Field Officers and 31 staff to man various check gates.
- COAL DEPOT: Has set up 4 coal depots, namely Singphan, Shetap, Tuli and Changki-Marani road. However, due to fund constraints, the required infrastructure in the designated coal depots could not be created.
- OUTSOURCING GATE: Outsourced 2 gates Tuli and Tsutapela during 2016-2017. During 2017-18, Tuli gate could not be outsourced as almost all coal mines were closed down and during 2018-19, 2 more gates were outsourced viz. Anaki C under Mokokchung and Shetab gate under Longleng.
- REVENUE COLLECTION: Collected revenue from coal sector to the tune of about Rs. 60 lakh during 2018-19.

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NAGALAND MINOR MINERAL CONCESSION RULES, 2004

- > The overall minor mineral resources such as sand stone, marbles, granite and slates assessed in the State is about 317 MMT.
- The Department is authorized to issue License and Permits and levy taxes and royalty on minor minerals.
- ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT TILL DATE: Issued 20 Stone Quarry Permits and 15 Bricks Quarry Permits to individual/parties. Set up 5 mineral check gates in Dimapur for collection of royalty.
- PETROLEUM AND NATURAL GAS DEVELOPMENT
- The State framed the Nagaland Petroleum and Natural Rules and Regulations, 2012 under Article 371 A. Oil exploration in the State has established a prognosticated reserve of Petroleum and Natural Gas to 600 million tonne in Northwest along Nagaland-Assam border.
- In the recent past, the State Government has awarded 3 oil zones in Nagaland to 2 oil companies, namely M/s Metropolitan Oil and Natural Gas Pvt. Ltd. and M/s Assam Oil Company India Ltd. for oil exploration.
- Constructed 3 field rest houses for oil exploration and exploitation at Changki, Changpang and New Peren Headquarter.
- Nagaland and Natural Gas Rules, 2012 if effectively implemented, can generate 500-600 lakh of annual revenue to the State exchequer.
- GROUND WATER SECTOR
- To monitor and regulate the haphazard development of ground water in the State, Ground Water Policy and Rules under State Water Policy is under formation by the Department.
- DETAILED WORK CARRIED OUT DURING 2018-19: Under Deposit - 11 wells (Plain Areas - 3 wells and Hilly Areas - 8 wells); Under Exploratory - 12 wells (Plain Areas - 5 wells and Hilly Areas - 7 wells)
- Revenue generated from ground water sector during 2018-19 is Rs. 16,72,438.
- > The Department has also taken up identification of potential sites for ground water recharge in Dimapur valley.

- 1st phase of hydro geological condition for artificial recharge to ground water in Jalukie valley carried out. Work achieved includes hydro geological and physiographic mapping, collection of hydro geological data of wells, streams, suitable geo-structures viz. gabions, cement plug, nala bund, check dam, recharge shaft etc.
- Census of tube wells, dug/ring wells, springs and water bodies carried out covering towns and sub-divisions of Kohima, Mokokchung, Dimapur and Wokha to identify and map the potential groundwater secondary aquifer for assessment of groundwater resources.
- Under collaborative work with CGWB, Ministry of Water Resources, Gol, the Department periodically collects water level data from 35 National Hydrographic Network Stations in Nagaland, set up by CGWB. These data collected periodically, sent to CGWB, NER, Guwahati along with water samples for analysis and interpretation.
- CHEMICAL LABORATORY
- WATER SAMPLE ANALYZED: 51 samples. Presence of Iron, Fluoride and Manganese which were above the permissive limit of Indian Standard for Drinking water detected in some samples.
- COAL SAMPLES: 7 samples. Proximate analysis of 7 coal samples carried out in the Department Laboratory.
- LIMESTONE SAMPLES: 9 samples. Found calcium oxide content in the samples ranging from 47% to 52%.

- GRANT-IN AID: At present, the Department is granting financial assistance in the form of Grants-in-Aid to 78 private recognized colleges and to other institutions involving an expenditure of Rs. 3,65,00,000 for 2018-19. The amount of assistance is decided on the performance of students, students' enrolment and other criteria.
- UNIVERSITY GRANTS COMMISSION (UGC): The State has been implementing the UGC revised pay scales, service conditions, minimum qualifications including National Eligibility Test (NET) for appointment of college teachers/college librarians at different grades in different disciplines. The selection procedure for appointment of principals in colleges, incentives for Ph.D/M. Phil and other higher qualifications, study leaves, and workloads of teacher are also in accordance to the rules as prescribed and laid down under the scheme of UGC.
- > OTHER ACTIVITIES
- 1. **POST CREATION:** 68 posts of Assistant Professors and Librarians were created during 2018-2019. 3 Vice-Principal posts were also created for colleges with more than 1,000 students enrolled.

- Temporarily affiliated (provisional) to Nagaland University and is recognized by the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), New Delhi. It offers full time regular B.Ed. course of 2 years with 4 semesters.
- **3. INITIATIVES IN 2018:** Setting up of Wifi campus with 2 internet connections with a speed of 8 mbps each.

> SAO CHANG COLLEGE, TUENSANG

- 1. Erstwhile Tuensang college, was established in 1973. Arts stream has 6 disciplines, namely English, Education, Economics, History, Political Science and Sociology. In Science stream, there are 5 disciplines -Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Mathematics and Zoology.

> PFUTSERO GOVERNMENT COLLEGE, PFUTSERO

- 1. Established in 1982, it offers B.A. course with honours in English, Tenyidie, Political Science, Education, History, Economics, and Sociology.
- SOME INITIATIVES IN 2018: Automation of library with SOUL 2.0 software; Interactive smart board purchased for teaching and learning process through RUSA fund.

HOME

- The Commissioner, Nagaland is the head of the District Administration in the State, and is also the Commandant General of the Village Guards Organization, the Ex-officio Director of Land Revenue and Head of Department for Civil Administrative Works Division (CAWD).
- 11 functioning District Headquarters, 29 Additional Deputy Commissioner Sub-Divisions, 18 Sub-Divisional Officer (Civil) Sub-Divisions and 63 Extra Assistant Commissioner circles in the State.
- Under Village Guards, there is Commandant, Village Guards at Tuensang, 1 Deputy Commandant each at Mon and Kiphire, ADC and Ex-Officio Deputy Commandant at Meluri and 1 Assistant Commandant at Longleng. Total of 9583 VG personnel.

1. BRIEF OVERVIEW OF THE DEPARTMENTS UNDER COMMISSIONER NAGALAND

DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION

LAW & ORDER: General law and order scenario in the State has been peaceful. The active intervention by the administration with the assistance of the police has ensured that small localized incidents have not mushroomed into larger issues.

- AADHAAR: The Commissioner, Nagaland is the Registrar for the registration of persons under the UIDAI (Unique Identity Authority of India) for the State. Nagaland was under the National Population Register (NPR) regime for generation of Aadhaar. However the State has come under the UDAI regime and there are 57 Enrolment Agencies (EA), more than 12 lakh Aadhaar numbers generated so far.
- ELECTION: Commissioner, Nagaland is the Returning Officer, and all the DCs and ADC, Pughoboto are the Assistant Returning Officers.
- VILLAGE GUARDS ORGANIZATION: During 2018-19, Rs. 100 lakh placed under the State Plan for construction of various infrastructure spread across the 5 VG Districts.
- LAND REVENUE: Activities of the department are confined mainly to the acquisition of land for the use of the State Government and the Central Government agencies, eviction of persons in unauthorized occupation of public land and collection of land revenue. The Nagaland Land (Requisition and Acquisition) Act, 1965 is applicable in the entire State. Revenue Administration comes under the respective Deputy Commissioner, and only Kohima and Dimapur districts have a Revenue Officer who assists the Deputy Commissioner.
- CIVIL ADMINISTRATIVE WORKS DIVISION (CAWD): Nodal executing agency for all the infrastructural development under General Administration, including maintenance of its own asset. Construction of new functional and non-functional buildings is taken up as per yearly budget allocation.

2. DIRECTORATE OF FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES

- **BUDGET:** The budget allotted is Rs. 3338.22 lakh during 2018-19 (Non-Development: Rs. 2938.22 lakh and Development: Rs. 400 lakh).
- **INPUTS:** The organization has the inputs for fighting the fire incidents which are distributed to various fire stations 43 Water Tender Pumps and 36 Other Vehicles.

ACHIEVEMENT

From January to October 2018, various categories of 99 fire calls responded to and property worth Rs.1268.20 lakh saved and estimated property loss was about Rs. 600 lakh. > Department website and biometric was launched during October 2018.

3. DIRECTORATE OF HOME GUARDS & CIVIL DEFENCE

- Home Guards are assisting the civil police for the maintenance of internal security, law and order, traffic regulation, besides providing protection to the important installation for both Central and State establishment, banks, VIPs house guard.
- NAGALAND STATE DISASTER RESPONSE (SDRF): Drawn from the serving Home Guards & Civil Defense,volunteers are trained as a special force for response to disaster, and these personnel have been stationed in 8 districts in order to respond to disasters promptly and efficiently.
- CENTRAL TRAINING INSTITUTE: Located at Toluvi, Dimapur conducted trainings such as Basic training for the Home Guards/Civil Defence Volunteers; Refresher course for State Disaster Response Force(SDRF); Disaster Management (SDRF) training for the NAP (IR) Bns/DEFs/Village Guards; Disaster Management (Dedicated State Disaster Response Force) training of the Home Guards Volunteers; and Disaster Management First Responder (MFR).
- AADHAAR BASED BIOMETRIC ATTENDANCE SYSTEM: To achieve the 100 days target activities of the various departments, the aadhaar based Biometric Attendance System (BAS) was formally launched in the Directorate on 3rd July 2018.
- MODERNIZATION SCHEME: With the use of this fund, improvement is being made in wireless communication, mobility, construction of infrastructure at district levels and CTI, Dimapur.
- BUDGETARY GRANT FOR 2018-19: Non-Plan is Rs. 3435.30 lakh and Plan (capital) is Rs. 435.12 lakh, approved under State Plan and Negotiated Loan.
- Developmental activities undertaken are construction of Officers Mess at Central Training Institute, Dimapur and construction of CRSM protection wall for District Commandant's Office, Phek.

4. DIRECTORATE OF PRINTING & STATIONERY

 The Department is a service department which caters to the printing and stationery requirements of the State/Central Government Departments.

- Caters to distribution of stationery items to different indenting departments. It also issues various scheduled forms/gazettes etc. free of cost to State Government establishments as per their annual requirements.
- The printing wing undertakes all government printing works such Official Gazettes; Finance Accounts; Appropriation of Accounts; Audit and CAG reports; writing pads; Nagaland wall calendars etc. Apart from normal workload, the Department also engages in printing speeches/invitations cards, annual administrative reports and budget documents.
- ACTIVITIES DURING 2018-19: For easy accessibility for all government departments, the Directorate has launched E-Gazette Section where Gazette and various forms can be downloaded.

5. DIRECTORATE OF PRISONS

- The Prison Department is an agency of the criminal justice system and is responsible for safe custody of UTPs, convicts and NSA detenus.
- 13 sanctioned jails, out of which 11 are functional. District Jail, Longleng is under construction.
- Budget has been allocated a plan outlay of Rs. 173 lakh and non-plan outlay of Rs. 5022.97 lakh.
- **CORRECTIONAL ACTIVITIES:** Vocational activities like handicrafts, weaving, tailoring, etc. are encouraged. Games and sports for inmates are held annually.

6. DIRECTORATE OF SAINIK WELFARE & RESETTLEMENT

- **EX-SERVICEMEN RALLY:** Organized for Kohima, Phek, Kiphire, Wokha and Zunheboto by the Red Shield Division (44 Mtn Bde), in coordination with Rajya Sainik Board, Nagaland on 16th May 2018 at Jakhama Military Station. Approximately 340 veterans and their families from 5 districts attended the rally. Also organized by HQ 41 Sub Area, Jorhat on 17th May 2018 for Mokokchung and Longleng which was attended by 168 ESM (Veterans, Veer Naris/Widows).
- WELFARE GRANTS TO EX-SERVICEMEN, WIDOWS AND DEPENDENTS: Welfare Grants like Funeral Expenses, Medical Treatment to non-pensioners, Marriage Grants, One Time Grant

to Battle/Physical Casualties and Lump-Sum Grants to children of ESM in Matriculation and above for admission in recognized Colleges/Institutions were distributed to ESM fraternity, widows and dependents.

- RECRUITMENT RALLY: Conducts Army and Navy recruitment rally for youth of Nagaland.
- **PARTICIPATION OF EX-SERVICEMEN IN NATIONAL DAY PARADES:** Almost in all the Districts HQs, Ex-servicemen of Nagaland have been participating regularly by fielding contingents with pride in Independence Day and Republic Day Parade(s) despite their old age.

7. <u>NAGALAND STATE DISASTER MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY</u> (NSDMA)

- The State capital Kohima along with Phek, Kiphire and Tuensang were cut off for some days due to numerous landslide caused by the incessant rain in 2018 resulting in several casualties damages to properties/crops/livestock.
- The NSDMA in coordination with the Department of Food & Civil supplies and the IAF successfully air-dropped essential commodities in the affected districts of Kiphire, Tobu, Tening, Noksen, Noklak, Pungro, Seyochung, Phongkuri, Wuzu and Thonoknyu.
- The NSDMA in coordination with line department conducted Nagaland Emergency Preparedness Exercise in all the 11 districts on the 26th April 2018.
- ADOPTION OF SCHOOL SAFETY POLICY: The District Education Officers (DEOs) as the Nodal Officers implemented the School Safety Policy guidelines at the district in coordination with the DDMA at the state level, and Advisory Committee and Working Committee were notified to prepare the State Action Plan for the School Safety Policy guidelines.
- **OPERATION DZUKOU:** The NSDMA and the DDMA Kohima led another operation to Dzukou on 7th June 2018 to rescue 4 stranded tourists. SDRF team comprising of 8 personnel along with a Platoon Commander was activated. The Emergency Response Team obtained the geo-coordinates and also prepared a 3D map which enabled the

rescue operation team to locate the exact position of the stranded tourists.

 DISASTER RISK INSPECTION ALONG NH 29, KOHIMA-DIMAPUR ROAD SECTION: Disaster risk and vulnerability assessment on the NH 29 which is under 4-lane construction was conducted jointly by NSDMA Dimapur, Home Department, PWD (Highways), NHIDCL, ECI, Gyatri, DDMA Kohima, DDMA Dimapur on 2nd july 2018.

8. RELIEF & REHABILITATION

 EX-GRATIA: Public servant killed/injured while executing bonafide government duties are entitled and paid ex-gratia depending on the status and nature of the duty. Civilians killed due to uncalled for action on the part of government officials on duty, police personnel and civilians killed in terrorist related incidents are also paid ex-gratia.

9. SECRETARIAT ADMINISTRATION BRANCH (SAB)

- Consists of 2 branches 'A' branch looks after the establishment matter of Stenographers, LDAs, Typists, Computer Staff and other Grade-III Staff under Nagaland Civil Secretariat and 'B' branch looks after the establishment matter of Grade-IV employees.
- SAB looks after the security of the Nagaland Civil Secretariat headed by Chief Security Officer from NPS Cadre. Also responsible for proper upkeep and maintenance of the Civil Secretariat Complex and providing accommodation to the officers and staff of the State Civil Secretariat.

10. SOCIETIES REGISTRATION CELL (HOME DEPARTMENT)

- During 2018-2019, 117 new societies registered and 246 societies renewed.
- Revenue realized on new registration of societies from January 2018 till date is Rs. 2,34000 and the revenue realized on renewal of societies inclusive of late fines during the same period is Rs. 4,92,500. Total revenue realized during January 2018 till date is Rs. 7, 26,500.

11. STATE GUEST HOUSES

GUWAHATI

- NAGALAND HOUSE, SIX MILE, KHANAPARA: There are 14 rooms available and 2 dormitories. VIP Suite with A/C (Rs. 1000 per day official duty); Room No. 101 to 108 (Rs. 1500 for unofficial duty); Single Room with A/C (Rs. 800 per day for official duty); Room No. 109, 110, 111, 114, 115, 116 - 2 bedded (Rs. 1200 per day for unofficial duty); Dormitory - Room No. 112, 113 - 14 bedded (Rs. 200 per day).

- NAGALAND HOUSE, SHILLONG: Located at Nongrim Hill, and was established in 1969. Total Revenue Collected from Inner Line Permit w.e.f. April 2018 to December 2018 is Rs 8,650,00. Ongoing Projects are 1) Renovated VVIP Bungalow which was renovated recently with

funds provided by the State Government; and 2) Upgradation and renovation of the main building which is under major renovation, and also 8 new rooms were added to the top floor of the building.

- A. Located 4th mile, Dimapur spanning an area of 31 ha, it encompasses entities such as Mushroom Development Centre, Central Tissue Culture Laboratory, Green Park, Orchards, Nurseries, Central Store, Rest house, Farmers Training Centre.

- B. Successfully conducted trail and demonstration on cultivation of a new mushroom variety, Carnicoby (Yellow Mushroom).
- C. Accredited with a 2 star rating for production of quality planting materials for Litchi, Guava, Khasi Mandarin and Sweet Orange.
- D. Rs. 5 lakh was allocated for the maintenance of the SHN.

3. DEVELOPMENT OF MUSHROOM

- A. 2 Mushroom Units operating at Dimapur and Mokokchung, and 3 Spawn Production Units, 1 each at Wokha, Mon, Kohima.
- B. Earmarked Rs. 7 lakh for maintenance of the departmental units under SDF 2018-19

4. FLORICULTURE DEVELOPMENT

- A. Organizes the Floral Galleria annually coinciding with the annual Hornbill Festival which gives an opportunity and a platform to showcase and market their flowers which in turn contribute significantly in the upliftment of their economic condition.
- B. Rs. 11 lakh earmarked under Floriculture Development during 2018-19.

5. MAINTENANCE OF FRUIT NURSERIES

- A. To augment the production of quality planting materials, the Department set up 16 Departmental Farms and Nurseries in the various districts of the State.
- B. Rs. 15 lakh earmarked during 2018-19.
- CREATION OF HORTI-LINK ROADS UNDER NEGOTIATED LOAN (NABARD): Earmarked Rs. 40 lakh under Negotiated Loan from NABARD to facilitate the creation of link roads from Lakhuti village to Sheruju village under Wokha district, during 2018-19.
- > PROJECTS UNDER NORTH EAST COUNCIL FUND
- 1. CREATION OF BOTANICAL GARDEN AND RECREATIONAL PARK AT JALUKIE, PEREN
- A. With the objective of promoting eco-tourism, the Department had under NEC, proposed for the establishment of Recreational Parkcum-Botanical Garden at Jalukie under Peren district. The project will serve the dual purpose of providing recreational facilities besides conserving the rich genetic diversity of the State.
- B. The project site is about 32 acres.

C. The Department so far received Rs. 114.8 lakh as NEC and State share for initiation of the works during 2017-18 and is yet to receive the balance amount of Rs. 172.20 lakh for completion of the project.

2. DRAGON FRUIT CULTIVATION

- A. The plant has a lifespan of over 30-50 years and hence is a very sustainable project.
- B. The 1st successful trail of cultivating Dragon Fruit was conducted at the Dream Dragon Fruit Farm at Shitovi village in Dimapur district in 2013 by Lucy Ngullie Thomas. The Dream Dragon Fruit Farm for cultivation of Dragon Fruit was approved by the NEC for a total project cost of Rs. 171.80 lakh.
- C. The Dream Dragon Fruit Farm is the sole dragon fruit nursery in the State and one of the few nurseries across the country to be accredited with a 1-star rating by the accrediting authority under Central Institute of Horticulture (CIH).

3. COCONUT DEVELOPMENT BOARD (CDB)

- A. About 15000 ha of land extending from Jalukie area in Peren to Tizit Valley area in Mon suitable for coconut plantation.
- B. Under Coconut Development programme, the Department is keeping a provision for procurement of coconut seedling, inputs for development of Dimapur, Peren, Wokha, Mokokchung, Mon, Kohima and Longleng.
- C. During 2018-19, CDB sanctioned Rs. 24.59 lakh for coconut plantation and development related schemes in 7 districts of Nagaland.
- > CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES
- 1. MISSION FOR INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT OF HORTICULTURE (MIDH)
- A. PRODUCTION OF PLANTING MATERIAL: Successfully initiated works for the establishment of 1 unit of small nursery for citrus seedling under the Public Sector at Mokokchung with Rs. 7.50 lakh, which is expected to meet the demand for quality planting materials for citrus.
- **B. AREA EXPANSION:** Under area expansion of vegetables, the existing area covering 800 ha in all the districts were targeted to encourage vegetables production and also enhance nutritional security. Total amount under area expansion activity was Rs. 156.50 lakh.

- C. **REJUVENATION:** To rejuvenate old and senile orchards for improving their productivity, the Department carried out the rejuvenation of 100 ha of citrus and 41 ha of passion fruit with Rs. 28.20 lakh.
- D. PROTECTED CULTIVATION: The challenge of meeting the demandsupply chain has necessitated that the State makes a paradigm shift towards modern and scientific technologies of crop production, one of which is protected cultivation. From the 1st installment, the Department has initiated the works for the installation of 60000 sqm of tubular structures for flowers and vegetables with Rs. 182.85 lakh.
- E. POST HARVEST MANAGEMENT AND MARKETING INFRASTRUCTURE: The Department has initiated the construction of 200 units of functional pack houses covering all the districts, 100 units of Low Energy Cool Chamber and 6 units of Rural Markets with an earmarked amount of Rs. 366.25 lakh from the 1st installment of MIDH 2018-19.
- F. REVIVAL OF OLD FLORICULTURE UNITS: Undertaken the revival of Old Floriculture Units with Rs. 200 units from the 1st installment of funds under MIDH.
- RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY): For 2017-2020, RKVY scheme is being renamed as RKVY-RAFTAAR i.e. RKVY - Remunerative Approaches for Agriculture and Allied Sector Rejuvenation. During 2018-19, Rs. 260.67 lakh released to the Department as both the Gol and State share, from which the following components were taken up under RKVY:
- A. PRODUCTION ORIENTED GAP FILLING FOR DOUBLING OF FARMERS: The Department earmarked Rs. 107.50 lakh during 2018-19 to take up plantation of various intercrops like Ginger, Turmeric, Tapioca, Sweet Potato, Cabbage, Tomatoes, Green Chive Onion And Garlic (Local) and Tree Tomato covering an area of 510 ha.
- B. SPECIAL SCHEME: Establishment of 113 units of low cost Oyster Mushroom Units with Rs. 56.50 lakh during 2018-19 under special scheme of RKVY (RAFTAAR).
- C. INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT OF CASHEW NUT: Cashewnut introduced in Nagaland proved to be very successful and after which commercial plantation started in 2002 along the foothill belts of the State. Rs. 157 lakh released to undertaking the area expansion of 1000 ha of cashewnut in the State.

- 3. MISSION ORGANIC VALUE CHAIN DEVELOPMENT FOR NORTH EAST REGION (MOVCD-NER): Launched during 2015-16 in the State. Under Phase II of MOVCD-NER starting from 2018-19 to 2020-21, the process of formation of farmers interest groups has been initiated for the formation of 4 FPCs/FPOs for spices in Peren, Ginger in Wokha, Passion fruit in Wokha and Mokokchung and Kiwi in Phek, Zunheboto and Kohima cluster, covering an area of 500 ha each.
- **PRADHAN MANTRI KRISHI SINCHAYEE YOJANA (PMKSY):** PMKSY focuses on creating water sources for assured irrigation, creating protective irrigation by harnessing rain water at micro level through 'Jal Sanchay' and 'Jal Sinchan.' Rs. 750 lakh released by the Gol as a Central Share for implementation of Micro Irrigation in the State under'Per Drop More Crop' component of PMSKY during 2018-19 and for which the release of funds is awaited from the State Government.
- GLOBAL LEADERSHIP AWARDS 2018 NAGALAND THE BEST HORTICULTURE STATE
- The State has been honored with the Best Horticulture State during the Global Leadership Awards 2018 for innovative policies towards transforming State Horticulture.
- The efforts of the Department has enabled the State to achieve the GI Registration of 'Naga Mircha' and 'Naga Tree Tomato' and the branding of 'Naga Pineapple.'
- For improving the market linkages for the horticultural farmers, Nagaland established for the 1st Local Horticulture Products Daily Market.
- The Department introduced the concept of Vegetable Village in the State and adopted potential villages as Vegetable Village which was the 1st of its kind in the country. The Department has successfully promoted the development of indigenous drier for cardamom aptly called SAWO drier, designed and developed through personal experience by a farmer for spices such as Large Cardamom and Naga Mircha.

> NAGALAND STATE DATA CENTRE (NSDC)

 The most crucial core technical infrastructure which the Department has been managing without taking the support of other Data Centre Operators (DCOs). It is providing various consolidated services such hosting applications and infrastructure to facilitate provisioning of efficient electronic service delivery of Government to Government (G2G), Government to Citizen (G2C), Government to Business (G2B) services etc.

 CHILD AND ADOLESCENT LABOUR (PROHIBITION AND REGULATION) AMENDMENT ACT, 2016: The minimum age for employment of children in hazardous occupations and processes has been raised to 18 years. Children below the age of 14 years are totally prohibited from any type of employment.

• LABOUR WELFARE CENTRES

- The State Labour Department established 4 Labour Welfare Centres at (1) Nagaland Pulp & Paper Company Ltd. Tuli, Mokokchung (2) Mini Cement Plant, Wazeho at Phek (3) 5th Mile, Dimapur (4) Doyang Hydro Electric Project, Wokha imparting 8 months training courses in cutting and tailoring, knitting and embroidery, fully sponsored by the Department.
- THE EMPLOYEES' STATE INSURANCE CORPORATION (ESIC) SCHEME
- It is an integrated measure of Social Insurance embodied in the Employees' State Insurance Act and is designed to accomplish the task of protecting 'employees' as defined in the Employees' State Insurance Act, 1948 against the impact of incidences of sickness, maternity, disablement and death due to employment injury and to provide medical care to Insured Persons (IP) and their families. Applies to factories and other establishments where 10 or more persons are employed.
- BENEFITS UNDER THIS SCHEME: Sickness benefit, disablement benefit, dependents benefit, maternity benefit, medical benefit.
- 1,203 insured persons availed medical benefits during the year under report.
- NAGALAND BUILDING AND OTHER CONSTRUCTION WORKERS WELFARE BOARD (NBOCWWB)
- Registered more than 12,000 workers of the State engaged in building and other construction activities.
- Provides welfare schemes for the beneficiaries and their family members in health, maternity, insurance cover, children education assistance and tools grant.

- > 114 workers trained during the special training programme.
- SOFT SKILL TRAINING FOR CONSTRUCTION WORKERS: A need to train the local workers in developing work etiquette and a positive attitude towards work, the Welfare Board, conducts 'Soft Skill' training in identified pockets where the construction workers are accessible. 300 workers from different pockets of Wokha town and Chukitong area successfully trained on soft skill.
- BENEFITS FOR WOMEN CONSTRUCTION WORKERS UNDER NBOCW WELFARE SCHEME: Tool grant, insurance under Aam Admi Bima Yojana, medical allowance, provides maternity benefit to women beneficiaries amounting to Rs. 5000 per delivery (subject to a maximum of 2 times).
- QUASI-JUDICIARY FUNCTIONS: The Building and Other Construction Workers (RE&CS) Act, 1996; The Workmen's Compensation Act, 1923; The Minimum Wages Act, 1948; The Trade Unions Act, 1926; Nagaland Shops and Establishment Act, 1986; The Factories Act, 1948; The Indian Boilers Act, 1923; The Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Amendment Act, 2016; and the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.
- FUNCTIONS OF THE INDUSTRIAL TRIBUNAL: It is mandatory under Section 7(A) of the Industrial Dispute Act, 1947 that the State Government shall appoint a Presiding Officer to preside over the Industrial Tribunal in the Directorate of Labour whose condition of service shall be on term basis.
- **LABOUR COURT:** Established the State Labour Court in Dimapur under Section 7 of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 in 1991. Industrial disputes relating to any matter specified in the second schedule of the said Act, which cannot be settled within the level of lower courts, can be referred to Labour Court for adjudication.

CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEME

> PRADHAN MANTRI KRISHI SINCHAYEE YOJANA (PMKSY-WDC)

- Erstwhile Integrated Watershed Management Programme (IWMP), it is a Centrally Sponsored Scheme under the Department of Land Resources, Ministry of Rural Development. 6 batches of PMKSY-WDC projects sanctioned by Gol covering all the 11 districts. Batch- I & II were completed in 2016-17 and 2017-18 respectively. Batch-III with a total size of 86,000 ha completed successfully during 2018-19.
- Different components covered includes community mobilization, capacity building, monitoring and evaluation, natural resource management such as construction of Water Harvesting Structures (WHS), soil moisture conservation works like trenching, bunding, terracing, afforestation, plantation and horticultural crops.
- STATE SCHEMES
- RUBBER DEVELOPMENT SCHEME: The Department has encouraged rubber plantation in the State, covering Peren, Dimapur, Wokha, Mokokchung and Mon through RIDF from NABARD and NEC schemes in convergence with PMKSY-WDC. During 2018-19, about 577 ha brought under rubber plantation achieving a cumulative area coverage of 19,077 ha.
- COFFEE DEVELOPMENT: Assisted farmers to develop more than 1,280 ha during 2018-19 bringing total area under coffee plantation in the State to about 6,180 ha. Nagaland has also achieved another milestone through coffee development by exporting about 8.50 MT of coffee beans produced in the State to Noble Cause Company Pvt. Ltd., a South Africa based company at international price.

> SPRINGSHED DEVELOPMENT

1. A new initiative of the Department, which is aimed at addressing water security and sanitation issues of identified natural springs. Main objective is to recharge the underground water for drinking and irrigation purpose through intervention at the recharge area.

- The Department has completed 11 springshed pilot projects covering 1 village in each district. The Department is in technical collaboration with People's Science Institute (PSI), Dehradun, Advance Centre for Water Resources Development and Management (ACWADAM), Pune and Arghyam, Bengaluru for capacity building and training of parahydrogeologists in the State.
- 3. The Department is currently implementing 6 springshed projects for treatment of 1,800 ha under NABARD funding which have entered Project Implementation Phase. Another 3 sanctioned covering 3 more districts during 2018-19, which are in pre-project implementation phase.
- SPRINGS INVENTORIZATION: Inventory of 2,353 springs in 1,024 settlements covering all districts is under progress for establishment of physical and water quality data.
- RESOURCE CENTRE, RUZAPHEMA: Established at Ruzaphema in 2004 in an area of 74 ha. The primary purpose of the Centre is to build institutional capacity and cater to the needs of the farming community and extension personnel of the region in upgrading their skills and knowledge on the modern method of farming based on local conditions and needs.
- COFFEE EXHIBITION 2018: The Department in collaboration with Nagaland Coffee Pvt. Ltd. Set up a Nagaland Coffee stall at Naga Heritage Village, Kisama during the Hornbill festival 2018 with the vision to create awareness on organic coffee produced in Nagaland.

LAND REVENUE

- The Department deals with the policy of land administration, land surveying, mapping for various developmental activities, construction of land records, digitization of surveyed maps and computerization of Records of Rights (RoR).
- The administrative office looks after Land and Revenue Administration headed by Commissioner, Nagaland who is also the Ex-Officio Director, Land Revenue and Land Records & Survey Department headed by the Director.

- The Commissioner, Nagaland is the Ex-officio Director of the Land Revenue Department and is assisted by the Deputy Commissioners of all the districts and subordinate Administrative Officers. However, in Kohima and Dimapur, there is a separate Revenue Officer in the rank of SDO(C) to assist the Deputy Commissioner in the land administration.
- During the last quarter of the financial year 2018-19, Rs. 47.23 lakh was realized as revenue by the Office of the Deputy Commissioner inclusive of land revenue.
- Survey Training Institute (STI) imparts basic training courses on Land Settlement and Revenue Administration for NCS/IAS probationers of the State and also conducts training courses to all the in-serving officers and staff of the Department.
- **CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES (CSS):** Under the Digital India Land Record Modernization Programme (DILRMP), the Department is implementing scheme in 7 districts, namely Mon, Tuensang, Zunheboto, Dimapur, Peren, Mokokchung and Phek where the field works for construction of Ground Control Points (GCP) are completed. Survey/Resurvey, collection of RoR (Record of Rights) and household Aadhaar number completed in all the 7 districts.
- SURVEY WORKS DURING 2018-19: Traverse Survey 2; Government Pocket Land – 65; Cadastral Survey – 5 (Achieved as on 31st January 2019).

LEGAL METROLOGY & CONSUMER PROTECTION

• FUNCTIONS

- The Department performs annual verification and stamping of weights, measures all weighing and measuring instruments used by traders, hawkers, LPG agencies, petrol pumps, other government departments and industrial establishment.
- It also performs the calibration of vehicle tanks which transport petroleum products to different parts of the State, and the calibration of storage tanks of oil corporations in the State.

- Provides better protection of consumer rights through the various consumer courts – the State Commission (Nagaland State Consumer Disputes Redressal Forum) in each district.
- It also grants aid to Voluntary Consumer Organizations (VCOs) and Consumer Societies in the State for strengthening the consumer movement.
- LABORATORIES
- NAGALAND SECONDARY STANDARD LABORATORY LOCATED AT KOHIMA: Equipped with standard sophisticated instruments such as the Secondary Standard Weights, Secondary Standard Balances, Secondary Standard Meter Bar, Secondary Capacity Measures and Clinical Thermometer Calibrators.
- WORKING STANDARD LABORATORY: Set up in 8 districts. Each Working Standard Laboratory has Working Standard Weights, Working Standard Capacity Measures, Working Standard Meter Bar and Working Standard Balances to verify commercial weights and measures, and instruments.
- CONSUMER DISPUTES REDRESSAL AGENCIES
- Nagaland Consumer Protection Council headed by the Chief Minister was constituted on 27th July 2004 to promote and protect the rights of consumers laid down in the Consumer Protection Act, 1986.
- District Consumer Protection Council constituted in each district on 6th August 2004 for the protection of consumer rights in the State.
- The Nagaland Consumer Disputes Redressal Commission, also known as the State Commission was set up under the provisions of the Consumer Protection Act, 1986 and the Consumer Protection Rules, 1987. It is presided by a retired Judge of the High Court, and addresses complaints of goods or services of values between Rs. 20 lakh up to Rs. 1 crore.
- District Consumer Forum presided by the Additional District & Sessions Judge, solves consumer complaints lodged by the consumers of the district in which it is located and where the value of goods or services and the compensation claimed does not exceed Rs. 20 lakh.

- NAGALAND STATE CONSUMER HELPLINE: It is an alternate consumer disputes redressal agency and has the Toll Free No. 1800-345-3701 and Phone No. 0370-2292232 (Normal call charges.)
- ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2018-19

LEGAL METROLOGY

- 40 cases prosecuted against defaulters of the Legal Metrology Act & Rules by Enforcement Officers. 3,384 cast iron, brass and other weights, 192 capacity measures, 89 length measures and 2,213 mechanical and electronic weighing, and measuring instruments verified and certified by the Department.
- The Department realized verification fees of Rs. 9,23,500 through verification and stamping of weighing and measuring instruments and compounding fees of Rs. 76,000 and license fees of Rs. 3300 from the issue of Packers' Licences and Dealers' Licences to packers of packaged commodities and dealers of weights, measures and weighing and measuring instruments

> CONSUMER PROTECTION

- Consumer Awareness Campaign was organized by the Department in collaboration with the Wokha District Legal Service Authority at Wokha, Mokokchung, Tuensang and Phek in collaboration with the Voluntary Consumer organizations, Consumer Clubs and Civil Societies of the respective districts.
- 11 consumer cases disposed off by the State Commission and 4 by the District Consumer Forum and the Nagaland State Consumer Helpline addressed consumer complaints and queries.
- BUDGET ALLOCATION DURING 2018-2019: Received a budget of Rs. 968.94 lakh under Non-Development and Rs. 140 lakh under Plan.

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

• ROLES AND FUNCTIONS

The objective of the Department is to assist the Urban Local Bodies in improving governance and equipping them with the information, skills and expertise necessary to discharge their functions and tasks.

- At present, there are 32 Statutory Towns comprising of 3 Municipal Councils and 29 Town Councils and also 5 Urban Stations in the State.
- CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES
- > KOHIMA SMART CITY MISSION
- Launched on 25th June 2015
- Kohima was selected under the Smart City Mission on 20th September 2016 during the second round of competition. The Kohima Smart City Development Ltd (KSCDL) was, on 24th March 2017, incorporated under the Companies Act 2013.
- The Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) for KSCDL was constituted on 9th March 2017 which will plan, apprise, approve, release funds, implement, operate, monitor and evaluate the Smart City Development projects.
- Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs has credited of Rs. 111 crore so far, with Rs. 2 crore being released as advance for preparation of Kohima Smart City proposal. In addition, Rs. 2 crore released as State Matching Share for the fund.
- Consequently, WAPCOS was appointed as the PMC for Kohima Smart City on 30th October 2018 for Rs 10.19 crore and the contract was signed on 22nd November 2018.
- > PROJECTS APPROVED BY THE SPV OF KOHIMA SMART CITY AS THE FIRST PHASE WHICH ARE BEING IMPLEMENTED NOW
- BEAUTIFICATION OF KOHIMA TOWN PHASE-I: Widening of road and construction of retaining walls with footstep, drainage and multi utility duct from NSF Martyrs Park till Box Cutting measuring 705m in length at a total estimated cost of Rs. 10.58 crore.
- 2. MULTI-LEVEL PARKING AT OLD MEDICAL DIRECTORATE: Construction of 6 storied building providing parking for 126 cars and 26 shops at a total estimated cost of Rs. 31.21 crore.

- It is a statutory body duly constituted through an Act of Parliament and comes under the administrative umbrella of the Personnel & Administrative Reforms Department of the State Government. The Commission is headed by a Chief Information Commissioner and is supported by 2 State Information Commissioners.
- AUDIT OF PROACTIVE DISCLOSURES FOR 2017-18
- The quick and quantitative analysis was carried out using 'Audit of Proactive Disclosures under RTI Act, 2005 – A Toolkit.' This audit portrays the level of transparency amongst the various public authorities in the State which is solely based on the proactive disclosures submitted by the public authorities for 2017-18.
- As per the quick analysis, the number of public authorities that was graded A (Highly Transparent) has increased and the number of public authorities that was graded C (Limited Transparent) and D (Pool level of Transparency) have decreased.

- ANALYSIS OF RTI APPLICATIONS/REQUESTS FOR 2017-18: The most sought after nature of information during 2017-18 were financial matters such as funds released, sanction orders, actual payee receipts, utilization certificates etc. followed by schemes related queries.
- THE COMMONWEALTH HUMAN RIGHTS INITIATIVE (CHRI) had, in its Rapid Review 4.0 (earlier called as Rapid Study) which was released on 12th March 2018 hailed the NIC as the 'lone example of perfect statutory compliance among the Information Commissions in the country which has all the Annual Reports on its website.' Besides, the NIC is reported to have the highest number of translations of the RTI Act in local dialects in the country, and has also displayed RTI User Guide /Citizens Guide to RTI in all its local languages on its website.
- REPORT ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF RTI ACT, 2005 FOR 2017-18
- > RTI APPLICATIONS RECEIVED AND FURNISHED OVER THE YEARS SINCE ITS INCEPTION (FROM 2006-07 TO 2017-18)
- 1. Total number of RTI applications received by the various public authorities in the State was 3,708, out of which information were furnished in 3,444 requests/applications. The overall percentage of information furnished by the PIOs of various Public Authorities during 2017-18 was 92.88%.

- 2. There has been a steady increase in the number of RTI applications received by the various Public Authorities in the State of Nagaland since its inception in 2006 from 2006-07 to 2015-16. However, there has been a decline in the number of RTI applications received by the various public authorities in the State from 4,526 request/ applications in 2015-16 down to 4,344 in 2016-17 and further to 3,708 during 2017-18. This decline can be attributed due to the increase in the level of transparency amongst the various public authorities.
- 3. During the period under report, out of the 3,708 odd RTI applications, the districts received more than 50% of the total number of RTI applications in the State, like in previous year at 52.43%, followed by the Directorates at 27.78%, Secretariat at 12.76% and other units at 7.04%.

NAGALAND PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION (NPSC)

- On 18th March 1965, the then Governor of Nagaland, Vishnu Sahay issued a Regulation under Article 318, determining the composition of members and staff of the Commission in respect to their conditions of service. Simultaneously, the NPSC (Limitation of Functions) Regulations, 1965 was passed. It was not until 3rd March 1966 when K. Sachidananda was appointed as the first Chairman of the NPSC, that was formally constituted under the Home Department's Notification No. 17/APA/10/66 dated the 12th May 1966.
- During 1st April 2017 31st March 2018, the composite strength of the Commission is 1 Chairman and 4 Members.
- **RECEIPTS:** During the year under report, the Commission received Rs. 48.42 lakh from collection of various examination fees as revenue to the State Government.
- REPORT OF THE WORKS EXECUTED BY THE COMMISSION
- In 2012, the Commission introduced Common Syllabus for NCS, NPS, NSS & Allied Services which is a major shift from the old pattern of optional papers in the Mains Examination.
- In 2014, under the National e-Governance Plant (NeGP), NPSC became the first in India to successfully implement fully online application and payment of fees for Civil Services (Preliminary) Examination.
- The Commission since 2010 has introduced SMS Notification Service, where the viva-voce dates and marks statements are notified to the candidates.
- The NPSC online application form can be accessed via internet from home, office, cyber cafes or Common Service Centers (CSCs). CSCs are operational in the State where applicants from remote villages can access online services from the nearest CSCs.
- The examination centres for NCS, NPS, NSS & Allied Services have been increased to 5 centres in the districts of Kohima, Dimapur, Mokokchung, Tuensang, Mon to reduce the inconvenience of candidates from remote areas of the State.

- **CONDUCT OF EXAMINATIONS:** The Commission is laid upon a major function to select and recommend meritorious and prospective young men and women to man the various Civil and Allied Services. This function is conferred upon the Commission through Article 320(1) of the Constitution of India.
- STATE EXAMINATIONS CONDUCTED BY THE COMMISSION
- THE NCS, NPS, NSS AND ALLIED SERVICES EXAMINATION: The most prestigious examination conducted by the Commission and the largest in terms of candidate enrolment. Any candidate possessing a minimum graduate degree from a recognized university is eligible to sit for this exam. The present recruitment process has 3 stages, namely 1) Preliminary 2) Mains 3) Interview.
- THE COMBINED TECHNICAL SERVICES EXAMINATION (CTSE): This examination assesses prospective candidate with knowledge in a specific area of study. It is an examination where candidates possessing the requisite qualifications go on to become Assistant Surgeons, Veterinary Surgeons, SDO, J.E etc. To qualify for this exam, a candidate has to undergo 2 stages of exam namely 1) Written Examination 2) Interview.
- DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATION: The Commission conducts departmental examinations for in-service Inspector of Taxes under Taxation Service, Assistant Conservator of Forest under the Forest Service and JDA/JAO under the Accounts Service. In-service personnel under these services are required to pass the departmental exams for further promotion which has been incorporated in their respective Service Rules.
- SPEED TEST EXAMINATIONS: The Commission conducts speed test examinations for both in-service Stenographers and Typists on a yearly basis to test their eligibility for promotion to higher grades.
- **CONDUCT OF UPSC/SSC EXAMINATION:** The Commission assists Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) and Staff Selection Commission (SSC) to conduct various examinations.

- ACCEPTANCE/NON-ACCEPTANCE OF THE ADVICE OF THE COMMISSION: As required under Article 323(2), there is no case where the advice/recommendations of the Commission was turned down by the Department and the Heads of Departments during 2017-18.
- REPORTS OF RIGHT TO INFORMATION FILED: The Commission received 18 RTI applications relating to reservation, examination matter, seeking of official documents among others during 2017-18.

- CONDUCT OF YOUTH PARLIAMENT AND PARLIAMENTARY QUIZ COMPETITION AND EXPOSURE TRIP: The State level Youth Parliament and Parliamentary Quiz Competition was held at Imagine Hall of the Administrative Training Institute, Kohima from 1st - 3rd October 2018. The District level competition was first held and the selected students participated from all the 11 districts, which was witnessed by higher secondary students of both private and government schools in Kohima. The best 14 students including the Programme Co-ordinator went for exposure trip and sightseeing to Mumbai-Goa-Imphal from 11th - 18th November 2018.
- HOSTING OF THE DEPARTMENT WEBSITE: The Department on 29th April 2018 signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Nagaland State e-Governance for design, development and maintenance of the Department website which was launched successfully.

- PROVIDING LAPTOPS TO ALL SURVIVING EX-PARLIAMENTARIANS AND MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT (MPs): Under State fund, the Department has purchased 175 laptops to be distributed to all surviving Ex-Parliamentarians and MPs.
- PUBLISHING OF BIO-DATA BOOKLET OF ALL MLAS FROM INTERIM BODY TO 13TH ASSEMBLY: It will serve as a source of information for all Members of Nagaland Legislative Assembly who had served in the past till the present 13th Assembly, compiled in one book and is in the process of publication.
- BIOGRAPHIES OF SPEAKERS AND DEPUTY SPEAKERS FROM INTERIM BODY TO 13TH ASSEMBLY: Research and compilation of biographies of Speakers and Deputy Speakers from Interim Body to 13th Assembly is under progress for publication.
- LIBRARY-CUM-RESEARCH CELL: Previously established at the State Library, located at P.R Hill was shifted to the Assembly Secretariat where rooms were allotted to the Department for maintaining books and journals. It is partly maintained by the Department for ready reference of Ministers, Advisors, Chairmen and other Senior Officials.

• LOCAL AREA DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (LADP)

- Came into being during the annual Plan 2003-04 by renaming the erstwhile District Plan.
- During 2017-18, Rs. 60 crore provided at Rs. 1 crore per Assembly Constituency and 50% of the fund amounting to Rs. 30 crore released for implementation of the schemes as per the Guidelines. It is expected that the fund will be fully utilized by March 2019.

- From 1998-99 till 2017-18, 169 projects sanctioned under NLCPR for an approved cost of Rs. 1,803.59 crore, out of which 102 projects completed and 67 are ongoing, for total approved cost of Rs. 918.53 crore.
- Funds released by Ministry of DoNER during 2018-19 for ongoing projects under NLCPR, Rs. 48.75 crore as of January 2019.
- NLCPR scheme discontinued since 2017-18, however the ongoing projects will continue till 2019-20.

- The Department has been designated as the Nodal Department under the Administrative Head of Development Commissioner to co-

ordinate the activities/functions of SDGs in the State. During 2018-19, Rs. 350 lakh provided for the purpose.

- The State's power requirement by 2020 is expected to reach 250MW. So far, the State has been able to develop only 1 major project i.e. Likhimro HEP which is of 24 MW.

- **TRANSMISSION SECTOR:** Upgradation of 60 to 100 MVA, 132/66kV at Nagarjan sub-station; Upgradation of 66 to 132kV Kiphire-Tuensang-Mokokchung transmission line; Construction of 220 kV Dimapur to Zhadima transmission line etc. are some of the recent developments.
- ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF TRANSMISSION SECTOR:
- UPGRADATION OF 66 kV TO 132 kV KIPHIRE-TUENSANG-MOKOKCHUNG SINGLE CIRCUIT TRANSMISSION LINE: On completion, the State would have a complete 132 kV Transmission Line loop through Kiphire-Kohima-Dimapur and Kiphire-Tuensang-Mokokchung-DHEP-Kohima-Dimapur transmission lines connecting with the above power projects as well as with the Northeast grid.
- CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONAL 24MVA, 132/32 kV SUB-STATION AT KOHIMA: It has relieved the existing system, help accommodate the anticipated load demand and also have a margin for meeting the future load demand of the State Capital.

- UPGRADATION OF 100MVA TO 2x100 MVA, 132/66 kV AND 132/33 kV TRANSFORMER AT NAGARJAN GRID SUB-STATION, DIMAPUR: To mitigate power crisis and to meet the ever growing demand of Dimapur and Peren districts, the project was proposed and funded under state resources and is now being made operational.
- **DISTRIBUTION AND REVENUE SECTOR:** The Department caters power supply to over 2.4 lakh consumers of different categories of which domestic accounts for over 80%.
- ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS
- HOUSEHOLD ELECTRIFICATION IN RURAL AREAS: During 2018-19, under the Central Government flagship programme of Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Gram Jyoti Yojana/Saubhagya, 100% electrification of all un-electrified villages and households completed by 31st December 2018.

> SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT

- In view of the overloaded system, construction of a new 33/11kV 2x10MVA Sub-station at Forest Colony, Dimapur is taken up under IPDS scheme with a project cost of Rs. 925.85 lakh, expected to be completed by June 2020.
- Standardization of 33kV and 11 kV line is under progress within Dimapur city area with replacement of standard height SP-35 poles by high clearance SP-76 and SP-66 steel tabular poles.
- 3. Under IPDS scheme, 11 kVTrunk Line covering 30 Km along main roads of Dimapur town to cater load demand and stability of power supply and segregation of Urban and Sub-Urban Feeders is in progress at a project cost of Rs. 906.32 lakh and scheduled completion by 2019.

> REVENUE

- 1. Through the Gol funded R-APDRP programme, IT enabled energy accounting system, online billing and collection are now in place in 9 major towns of the State.

3. POWER PURCHASE AND REVENUE RECEIPTS FOR THE LAST 3 YEARS:

4. With communitisation, the concept of Single Point Metering (SPM) has been adopted. SPMs are managed by Boards which is the Urban Electricity Management Board (UEMB) in urban areas and Village Electricity Management Board (VEMB) in rural areas. More than 95% of villages are under the ambit of communitisation.

PUBLIC HEALTH ENGINEERING

- URBAN WATER SUPPLY: Urban Water Supply schemes taken up by the Department are funded by various Central Government Ministries such as Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs, DoNER under the funding pattern of 90:10, Central-State.
- CENTRAL SCHEMES
- AUGMENTATION OF WATER SUPPLY TO KOHIMA TOWN: Taken up under 90:10 funding under the Ministry of Urban Development, Gol. The project involves pumping of water from Zaru stream to a reservoir at Kigwema village through 2 stages of pumping. The design capacity of the project is 3.80 million litres daily. 100% completed and is targeted for commissioning during 2018-19.
- AUGMENTATION OF WATER SUPPLY TO WOKHA TOWN (NLCPR): Sanctioned during 2012-13, with an approved cost of Rs. 1,959.60 lakh designed for a capacity of 3.75 million litres daily. Major works in the project include diversion weirs, RCC circular desilting, sedimentation tank, rapid sand filter, pumping units and water distribution system. Completed and commissioned on 12th October 2018.

- DIVERSE ACTIVITIES AND TECHNOLOGIES FOR DRINKING WATER
 SOLUTIONS
- ACTIVITIES UNDER NORMAL COMPONENT (COVERAGE/WATER QUALITY AFFECTED): 49 habitations in rural areas of the State provided with water supply facility under NRDWP during 2017-18. 20 habitations with water quality problems provided with drinking water supply. During 2018-29, 60 habitations will be provided with drinking water supply, out of which 36 completed as on January 2019.
- SUSTAINABILITY/FUNCTIONALITY COMPONENT: Sustainability structures constructed during 2017-18 under sustainability component are Rejuvenation of traditional wells - 38 units and Solar powered water treatment units - 2 units. During 2018-19, 42 habitations are proposed under this component.
- RURAL WATER SUPPLY SCHEMES TAKEN UP THROUGH VARIOUS MINISTRIES: NLCPR Projects with the funding pattern of 90:10 by Central-State Government.

- WATER SUPPLY SCHEME FOR 24 VILLAGES OF CHIEPHOBOZOU R. D BLOCK (NLCPR): With an approved cost of Rs. 2,626.41 lakh, the project was initially sanctioned during 2009-10 and again revised during 2010-11. Completed and is targeted for commission within 2018-2019.

URBAN SEWERAGE AND SANITATION

- Pollution Abatement of Dhansiri and Diphu rivers at Dimapur is a sewerage project for Dimapur town.
- The cost of project was revised in 2013-14 out of which Rs. 82.8 crore for Part (a) has been approved. Part (b) of the project is under consideration of the Ministry of Urban Development.
- > 43% of works pertaining to Part (a) of the project completed.
- ENVIRONMENTAL IMPROVEMENT AND SUSTAINABLE CONSERVATION OF TWIN LAKES IN MOKOKCHUNG: Conservation of twin lakes, namely Amok Lushi (under Chuchuyimlang village) and Yimdong Awantsung (under Mokokchung village), was sanctioned for Rs. 25.83 crore by the Ministry of Environment, Forests & Climate Change, Gol under the National Lake Conservation Plan. 55% of the works completed.

• SWACHH BHARAT MISSION (GRAMIN)

- Launched on 2nd October 2014 which replaces the erstwhile Total Sanitation Campaign/Nirmal Bharat Abhiyan.
- Aims to achieve Clean India by 2019, as a tribute to Mahatma Gandhi on his 150th Birth Anniversary.
- Aims at improving the level of cleanliness in rural areas through Solid and Liquid Waste Management activities and making Gram Panchayats/ villages Open Defecation Free (ODF), clean and sanitary.
- The State has been declared Open Defecation Free (ODF) on 2nd October 2018.
- SUPPORT ACTIVITIES UNDER NRDWP: Information Education and Communication (IEC); Human Resource Development; and Integrated Management Information System (IMIS).

WATER QUALITY MONITORING AND SURVEILLANCE UNDER NRDWP

- The initiative includes steps for tackling water quality problems from 2 pronged approach: 20% of the annual NRDWP funds is earmarked for tackling water quality problems in the villages, and 3% for Water Quality Monitoring and Surveillance (WQMS) to ensure quality of water, under which village level functionaries are trained on water quality aspects-samplings, testing and monitoring to ensure safe drinking water at all times.
- Normally water samples are tested twice in a year for bacteriological and once for chemical contamination. Results are submitted online on the Ministry of Drinking Water & Sanitation official website through IMIS on regular basis.
- **REVENUE COLLECTION:** Generates revenue by way of water fees from registered water consumers, mostly from urban areas of the State. Water fees from rural water consumers are collected by the WATSAN Committees which augment the internal resources of the Committees for O&M of the village water and sanitation facilities, and therefore, do not contribute to the Department revenue. During 2018-19, Rs. 206,70 lakh was collected as revenue.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

- 74 Rural Development Block in the State covering 1285 recognized villages with 2,50,315 rural households.
- CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEME
- > MAHATMA GANDHI NATIONAL RURAL EMPLOYMENT GUARANTEE SCHEME (MGNREGS)
- 1. Funded on the basis of 90:10 by the Gol and State Government respectively.
- Initially, one district for implementation of NREGEGA in the State. Accordingly Mon district with its backward status selected as Phase-1 NREGA District for implementation of the scheme during 20-0-5-2006. All districts in the State covered under NREGS through the Gol notification.

- **3. OBJECTIVE OF THE SCHEME:** To provide 100 days of guaranteed employment in a financial year to every household in the rural areas and whose adult members, by application, are willing to do unskilled manual works; Rs.177 per day per person for FY 2018-19.
- 4. A person who is registered under the scheme and who has applied for employment but is not given employment within 15 days shall be entitled to receive unemployment allowances at the rate of onefourth of the daily wage for the first 30 days and thence half per day beyond that.
- 5. **FUNDING:** The Central Government will bear the entire cost i.e. 100% of wages of unskilled manual workers. 75% of the cost of material and wages of skilled and semi-skilled workers. Administrative expenses as may be determined by the Central Government.
- The State Government will bear 25% of the cost of material and wages of skilled and semi-skilled workers, unemployment allowance.
- 7. STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SCHEME DURING 2018-19
- A. Till date, 4.33 lakhs jobcards issued with 7.21 lakhs workers registered.
- B. Current status of active workers is 5.77 lakhs.
- C. During 2018-19, Rs. 90 lakh person days generated against the Approved Labour Budget target of Rs. 127.01 lakh for the year. Rs. 14516.48 lakh received (Central Share Rs. 13886.48 lakh and State Share Rs. 630.00 lakh) against a total of Rs. 0.05 lakh works/projects. All MGNREGS works are implemented through the respective VDBs in the State.

> PRADHAN MANTRI AWAAS YOJANA-GRAMIN (PMAY-G)

- 1. Earlier known as Indira Awaas Yojana and structured into (PMAY-G) w.e.f. 1st April 2016 funded on the cost sharing ratio of 90:10 between the Gol and the State Government.
- Objective is to provide a pucca house with basic amenities to all houseless household and household living in kutcha and dilapidated house by 2022. Immediate objective is to cover 1 crore households living in kutcha hosue/dilapidated houses in 3 years from 2016-17 to 2018-19.
- 3. Aims to implement the programme through the Village Development Boards (VDBs).

- 4. Out of the total fund Rs. 5733.307 lakh as 1st instalment available, 4238 houses will be constructed in the rural areas.
- 5. As against the target of 8481 houses, 8738 beneficiaries registered and 5655 proposed site of house construction geo-tagged and 3072 houses sanctioned.
- 6. In addition to the existing beneficiaries, the State identified 36700 beneficiaries to be added for assistance.
- > DEENDAYAL ANTYODAYA YOJANA (DAY) NATIONAL RURAL LIVELIHOODS MISSION (NRLM)
- 1. Current coverage of 758 villages, with dedicated Mission Management Units under 43 Blocks across 9 Districts.
- MISSION: Aims at reducing poverty through building grass root Community Institutions (Self Help Groups/Federations) by targeting to reach out to the poorest of the poor rural women, and enable them to come out of poverty through meaningful engagement in livelihoods.

3. INSTITUTIONAL BUILDING AND CAPACITY

- A. State Mission has mobilized 55168 rural households into women-run functional grassroot institutions of 6070 Self Help Groups (SHG) and their higher level institution of 282 Village Level Organisations (VLO) and 14 Cluster /Block Level Organisations (CLF).

- A. To foster Income Generating Activities, the State Mission provided Community Investment Support Fund of Rs. 3310 lakh to SHGs.
- B. 18 Organic Clusters veering 100 Hectare by 4000 Mahila Kisanunder farm livelihoods developed. 5479 households taken up Nutri Kitchen Gardening. 19 Vehicles under AGEY in 19 Village Level Organisation and 50 Custom Hiring in 50 villages underway.
- C. Livelihood collectives/producer group initiated in 9 Resource Blocks.
- D. 850 piggery units jointly supported by NRLM and SRTT; and 147 units jointly supported by NRLM and MGNREGA.
- 6. OTHER INITIATIVES: 3000 Mahila Kisan are covered under the intervention of MKSP in 75 villages under 9 Intensive Blocks; 1733 rural youths trained under Rural Self Employment Training Institute (RSETI); and 2248 rural enterprises set up under Startup Village Enterprise Program (SVEP), while 408 youths trained (50 placed) under DDU-GKY (Skilling).
- 7. RESOURCE CENTRE: 336 social development professionals with each resource block equipped with 20-25 trainers who are engaged at the Resource Cells. At the community level, 1095 community cadres engaged in strengthening grass root institutions, building their capacity, facilitating financial inclusion, self-monitoring and reporting.
- > SHYAMA PRASAD MUKHERJI RURBAN (SPMRN) NATIONAL RURBAN MISSION (NRuM)
- To stimulate local economic development and enhanced basic services. This ambitious bid to transform rural areas to economically, socially and physically sustainable spaces was launched on 21st February 2016.
- Pedi (Ngwalwa) Cluster under Peren district was approved in the Phases 1 vide Government of India D.O. No. J-12011/20/2015/ RURBAN, Dated 29th April 2016.
- Kohima Sadar cluster under Kohima district, was approved in the Phases 111 (Non Tribal) vide Government of India Letter NO. J.122011/01/22016-RURBAN (Pt-1 (SI.No. 48) dated 26th December 2017.
- 4. Desirable Components and Scheme Convergence.

- 5. The Rurban clusters would be developed by provisioning of training linked to economic activities, developing skills, local entrepreneurship and by providing necessary infrastructure amenities.

Components are envisaged as desirable in each cluster as Agro processing, Agri Services, Storage and Warehousing; Upgrading School/Higher Education facilities; Sanitation; Provision of piped water supply; Inter-village road connectivity; LPG gas connections; and Citizens Service Centres (CSC) for electronic delivery of citizen centric services/e-gram connectivity.

- 2. Funded on 75:25 basis between the Central and the State; the funding ratio in respect of North East has now been revised to 90:10 w.e.f. financial year 2008-09.

 During 2018-19, Rs. 494.04 lakh received as 1st and 2nd Installment Central Share, and Rs. 220.00 lakh is proposed under State Plan as 10% Matching Share for meeting the administrative expenses which is still awaited.

> RASHTRIYA GRAM SWARAJ ABHIYAN (RGSA)

- 1. Launched on 24th April 2018, to develop and strengthen the Panchayati Raj system across India mainly in rural areas. Funding pattern 75% by the Central Government and 25% by the State Government. However, the ratio of funding is 90:10 for North Eastern states.
- 2. During 2018-19, MoPR has approved the total plan of Rs. 876.00 lakh and sanctioned Rs. 7.89 lakh as Central Share 90% and received 1st instalment of Rs. 394 lakh under RGSA for preparation of Gram Panchayat Development Plan (GPDR) and capacity building. Rs. 87.60 lakh earmarked as State Matching Share.

• STATE SPONSORED SCHEMES

> GRANTS-IN-AID TO VDBS (GIA)

- 1285 VDBs in the State with 2,50,315 tax paying households. Fund is allocated on the basis of number of tax-paying households at Rs. 1000 for implementation of developmental activities.
- 2. This is the only programme which ensures the participation of womenfolk in the activities of VDBs by earmarking of 25% of the fund allocated to the village. Another 20% of the fund is also earmarked for youth programme in all the villages.
- 3. Funds are deposited at Rs.10,000 for villages having 50 households and below and Rs. 200 per household for villages having 51 households and above from the general allocation to mobilize resources for the VDBs to supplement their activity.
- 4. During 2018-19, Rs. 3500 lakh proposed under this programme for allocation of funds to the Village Development Boards (VDBs) to take up income generating schemes as well as infrastructures development in the villages. Release of fund is awaited.
- During 2018-19, Rs. 9600 lakh received under Grant-in-Aid/Special Financial Assistance to rural local bodies for those areas not included in Part IX and Part IXA of the Constitution during 2017-18, from the

Ministry of Finance and to be implemented during 2018-19, which is inclusive of restoration of backlog funds for 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2017-18.

> MATCHING CASH GRANT (FIXED DEPOSIT)

- Introduced in the later part of 5th Plan with a view to encourage the VBSs to raise its own village resources, either through household contribution, donations or by implementation of project through community participations and other innovative means.
- 2. The maximum ceiling limit of Rs. 75,000 fixed earlier has now been enhanced to Rs. 2.50 lakh for each VDB.
- > PROMOTION OF MICRO-FINANCING ACTIVITIES THROUGH VDBs
- 1. Nagaland has been selected for experimenting with a pilot scheme whereby the VDBs will take up the responsibility of obtaining loans from the banks and its disbursal to beneficiaries and also for recovery of the same, for which initially, 25 VDBs selected were declared as Financial Intermediaries for the purpose.
- A Corpus Fund of Rs. 1 lakh was created through contributions of VDBs (40%), Gol (20%) and Government of Nagaland (90%) which has been revised as NABARD - Rs. 1,00,000; State Government - Rs. 1,00,000; VDB - Rs. 40,000
- 3. With the successful implementation of the pilot project, the State Government has decided to cover all the VDBs as Financial Intermediaries in phased manner. NABARD has agreed to participate in the process/implementation of the scheme, initially for Longleng and Kiphire districts during 2012-13, which will gradually cover the remaining districts as well.

SCHOOL EDUCATION

- RASHTRIYA MADHYAMIK SHIKSHA ABHIYAN (RMSA)
- ORGANIC FARMING: Implemented in 85 Government High Schools during 2018-19. Some schools are doing well which also gives support to Mid Day Meal kitchen, study on process of plants growth and even making vermicompost.

- > VOCATIONAL EDUCATION
- 1. Implemented in 18 GHSS/GHS across the State.
- MULTI-SKILL FOUNDATION COURSE (MSFC): The course is divided into 4 modules, namely Workshop & Engineering Techniques; Energy & Environment; Gardening, Nursery and Agricultural Techniques; and Food Processing Techniques (Level 1-Personal Health & Hygiene Level 2-Implemented in 4 schools, namely GHSS Thinuovicha Memorial (TM) Kohima; GHSS Dr. Neilhouzhu Kire, Kohima; GHSS Diphupar A, Dimapur; GHSS Purana Bazaar, Dimapur.
- SELF-DEFENSE TRAINING FOR GIRLS: Provided to 1 teacher each from all GHSS /GHS by engaging Nagaland Taekwondo Association so as to train girl students in schools on regular basis.
- EXPOSURE TOUR FOR CLASS 10: Organized under Rashtriya Avishkar Abhiyan intervention on 16th October 2018, where 550 students representing Kohima, Dimapur, Peren, Mokokchung, Wokha, Tuensang and Longleng visited the North Eastern Institute Science & Technology (NEIST) in Jorhat, Assam.
- SCIENCE EXHIBITION: Conducted at the district level from 24th September 2018 to 17th October 2018, covering all the 11 districts. The theme for the year was 'Consequences of Climatic Change.'
- KALA UTSAV: Held in all the District Headquarters, in the presence of officials from the State Mission Office, RMSA. Competitions were held in dance, music, theatre and visual arts categories.
- LEARNING ENHANCEMENT (REMEDIAL TEACHING): The Remedial Teaching for Class IX students started in all government schools of Nagaland in September to November 2018, targeting the 20% of weak students (2,998 students) for Science and Mathematics.
- SOFTWARE AIDED LEARNING: RMSA Nagaland engaged M/S I. Cube Technologies & Services Pvt. Chennai to implement Software Aided Learning for Class 9 and 10 in Mathematics and Science.
- MUSIC: Music as an extra-curriculum activity was launched on 18th October 2018 and implemented in 11 GHSSs during 2018-19. The syllabus is as per NBSE curriculum but initially the music intervention is placed as co-curriculum. Musical instruments and sound systems were provided to the schools.

- **PRIMARY SCHOOL LEAVING CERTIFICATE EXAMINATION 2018:** Examination was conducted successfully from 16th to 20th Novermber 2018 with 20,000 students from 1,470 Government Schools appearing the exam at 741 exam centres.
- SARVA SHIKSHA ABHIYAN (SSA)
- KASTURBA GANDHI BALIKA VIDYALAYA (KGBV), 2018-19: The State is running 11 KGBVs sanctioned for Class VI to VIII in 11 Educational Backward Blocks enrolling 1,100 girls (100%) against 1,100 targeted enrollment. All KGBVs are managed by different NGOs under MoU.
- SPORTS AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION: The SMA (SSA) in collaboration with Nagaland Wrestling Association participated in the 64th National Belt Wrestling Championship, 2018-19 under School Games Federation of India (SGFI) from 6th to 8th January 2019 at Karnataka with 11 students (7 boys and 4 girls) from different schools participating.
- RESIDENTIAL HOSTEL: The State runs 6 Residential Hostels with an intake capacity of 50 children in each hostel which are in Dimapur, Mokokchung, Peren, Phek, Wokha and Zunheboto.
- SCHOLARSHIP SECTION
- PRE-MATRIC SCHOLARSHIP FOR MINORITY STUDENTS: 100% centrally sponsored with Direct Benefits Transfer payment mode from the Ministry for students belonging to minority section from Classes 1-10. Rs. 800.73 crore was sanctioned for 24,807 students during 2017-18. For 2018-19, payment is in the process through DBT from the Ministry.
- PRE-MATRIC SCHOLARSHIP BELONGING TO SCHEDULE TRIBE STUDENTS STUDYING IN CLASS IX AND X: Disbursed scholarship amounting to Rs. 2,82,44,250 through Direct Benefit Transfer to 12,553 students during 2018-19.
- NAGALAND GOVERNMENT SCHOOL STUDENTS MERITORIOUS AWARD (NGSSMA): State Sponsored Scheme given to merit students studying in Government Schools of the State. During 2018-19, the name and implementation procedure has been changed from Children Education Assistance Fund (CEAF) to NGSSMA and the award will be given to meritorious students for toppers passing out in

different 3 stages of Exam i.e. Primary Leaving Certificate Examination, Elementary Leaving Certificate Examination and High School Leaving Certificate. The Department has earmarked Rs. 25,41,600 for 428 merit students.

- STIPEND FOR GIRL STUDENTS AT SECONDARY STAGE: State sponsored stipend scheme for those girls studying in Class IX and X at Government High Schools and GHSSs who are from economically weaker families. Each Headmaster of Government Schools can nominate 2 girls from each class and submit with their PCR at the Directorate for disbursement of stipend. The Department disbursed Rs. 11,72,000 for 1,172 girl students during 2018-19.
- GRANT FOR CHILDREN OF POLICE PERSONNEL KILLED IN ENCOUNTER WHILE ON DUTY: The Department has earmarked Rs. 1 lakh every year for this purpose from the allocated fund to Scholarship Section under Non-Plan. The Department pay a lump-sum for their admission and school fees for these students till Class 10, provided the scholar is successful and subject to his/her good progress record on regularity, good conduct and good academic result. During 2018-19 the Department disbursed 1.8 lakh for 12 students through their account.
- STIPEND TO STUDENTS STUDYING AT GOVERNMENT HINDI INSTITUTE, DIMAPUR: The Department has given stipend to the Hindi Institute students every year from the allocated fund under scholarship by the State Government. This is the only scholarship availed by these students studying at this institute. During 2018-19, the Department disbursed Rs. 4.80 lakh to the students through their account.
- MID DAY MEAL SCHEME
- The Gol introduced Mid Day Meal Programme under the scheme entitled 'National Programme of Nutritional Support to Primary Education' (NPNSPE) launched on 15th August 1995 in the country as a Centrally Sponsored Scheme.
- The MDMS is an entitlement of students from Classes 1 to VIII of government and government aided schools.
- > The State has begun involving NGOs in 2 districts, Tuensang and

Longleng, for implementation of MDM in their areas of operation, the NGOs - Eleutheros Christian Society (ECS) for Tuensang district and Phom Community Development Society (PCDS) for Longleng district.

During 2018-19, 1,63,701 children from 2,059 government schools and 44 NCLP schools covered as per the provision of the entitlement of students from Classes 1 to VIII.

• SAAKSHAR BHARAT PROGRAMME

- Launched on 8th September 2011 under the programme Adult Education Centres (AECs) are opened in all the interior villages of Mon, Tuensang, Longleng and Kiphire.
- OBJECTIVE: Imparting functional literacy, basic education, vocational skill development and continuing education programme.
- AREA COVERAGE: Mon, Tuensang, Longleng and Kiphire covering 349 Gram Panchayats (GPs)/Villages, 26 Blocks with target of 1,14,307 non-literates approved by Gol.
- LEARNERS ASSESSMENT TEST: Conducted by National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) in collaboration with State Literacy Mission Authority (SLMA), Nagaland.
- PLANNING SECTION

- The projects/schemes undertaken by the Department are Pre-Matric Scholarship-Minority Communities, Nutritional Support to Mid Day Meal (MDM), Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA), Saakshar Bharat (Adult Education) and Language Teacher (Salary of Hindi teacher).
- Rs. 100 lakh approved and sanctioned for printing of Local Dialect Textbooks under State Earmarked Programmes during 2018-19.

Rs. 250 lakh (Under Negotiated Loan) sanctioned for construction of GHS Phesachadu, GHS Longching, GHS Zuketsa, GHS Chunlikha, GHS Phoyisha and GHS Rüzhükhrie.

> SAINIK SCHOOL, PUNGLWA

- 1. During 2018-19, Rs. 1 crore sanctioned by the State Government as additional fund for immediate construction of 1 unit each of Grade-II staff quarter and Grade-IV staff quarter.
- 2. The Department also supports indigenous cadets through scholarship with Rs. 50,000 per cadet. The revision of scholarship for enhancement of 10% is under active consideration by the State Government.

HINDI SECTION

- 119 in-service Hindi teachers were deputed to Central Hindi Institute, Agra and CHI, Dimapur centre for in-service professional training, namely Visheshgahan, Praveen and Parangat (D. El. Ed/ B. Ed.).
- Admission criteria for Hindi professional training at Government Hindi Institute (GHI), Dimapur has been made 10+2 (with Hindi as a subject or Kovid, Visharad etc. passed) instead of Class 10 passed.
- Under Rationalization Policy, 326 Hindi teachers (UGT/GT) reverted back to government schools and also excess Hindi teachers were redeployed to schools where there was shortage of Hindi teachers.
- Proposed to upgrade/establish the present GHI to that of Hindi Institute of Education & Training (HIET) in line with District Institute of Education & Training (DIET), is under process.
- 15 Naga students (girls) are studying at Banasthali Vidyapith, Rajasthen from Class 4 to post graduate level.
- TEXT BOOK SECTION: Free textbook and MIL local textbook for the Government school students up to class 8 is being issued since 4th Febraury, 2019.
- SCIENCE SECTION
- National Level Science Seminar The winner of State Level Science Seminar took part at the National Level Science Seminar held at VITM, Bengaluru on 5th October 2018.
- I6 students and 4 Teacher Guides represented the State at the week long Eastern India Science Fair which was held at Birla Industrial and Technology Museum, Kolkata from 8th to 12th January 2019.

• NIOS D. El. ED. & PDPET PROGRAMMES

- As per RTE Act, 2009 it is mandatory to have professionally qualified teachers in all the schools at the elementary level and those teachers remaining untrained beyond March 2019 has to be compulsorily released from service.
- Academic Department of the National Institute of Open Schooling has developed the 18 months Diploma in Elementary Education (D. El. Ed).
- In this regard, the Department selected 62 study centres throughout the State and 5,652 untrained teacher trainees are undergoing the D. El. Ed. Programme.

SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY

- **BUDGET ALLOCATION:** Non-Plan allocation is Rs. 238.45 lakh and Plan allocation for 2018-19 is Rs. 494.00 lakh.
- ACTIVITIES/ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2018-19
- NAGALAND SCIENCE CENTRE, DIMAPUR: Only Science Museum in the State and has a 3D theatre, an Innovation Hub along with a 50 seater, Space & Astronomy Exposition Centre with Fun Science Gallery (Our Senses Gallery), Science Park. The Department has established an Innovation Hub and a 50 seated Space Education Centre (Planetarium) at Nagaland Science Centre, Dimapur on 28th September 2018.
- DIGITAL PLANETARIUM AT KOHIMA: Funded by HUDCO, Negotiated Loan. The Centre will have both Planetarium and Innovation Hub to provide the same facilities and nurture new and innovate ideas of young minds, and is anticipated to be completed by 2019.
- SETTING UP OF A SCIENCE PARK AT KOHIMA: Set up the State Capital along with the Nagaland Science Centre, Dimapur side by side to promote advance knowledge on scientific wonders and bring innovative ideas into reality.
- SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY FOR WOMEN: The Department has started the production of sanitary napkins, which is quality based, cost effective, hygienic and easily decomposable.

- RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS: Some of the research projects supported by the Department are as follows:
- 1. Orchid Nursery both local and imported Kohima Science College, Jotsoma.
- Impact of Water Conservation Practices on Pigeon Pea and their effect on Soil Arthropods - SASRD, Medziphema.
- 3. Preparation of castle soap using non-timber forest produce and traditionally used medicinal herbs FAC.
- 'Documentation of Indigenous Medicinal Plants in Mokokchung district'-APMC, Mokokchung
- 'Mass Spectrometry analysis of bioactive compound and screening of antibacterial activities of whole plant for methanol extract of Polygonum molle.'
- PROMOTION OF ACTIVITIES FOR LOCAL INNOVATORS: Some innovators are developing new and low cost technologies for easy method of harvesting, cutting tea leaves, tapping energy from sun, wind, water, biomass and bio fuel etc. The Department is providing technical and financial support to many innovators in the State.
- SCIENCE POPULARIZATION: The Department is successfully organizing series of science popularization programmes every year including the celebration of National Science Day on 28th February every year. It also conducts science seminars/workshops/fares/ exhibition etc. and under which, every year, selected students from various schools have been participating in 3 weeks intensive training in all science subjects conducted by J. C. Bose Institute, Kolkata, Darjeeling Campus.
- NASTEC ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENT FOR 2018-19
- BIOTECHNOLOGY HUB: Nagaland Science & Technology Council (NASTEC) set up a Biotechnology Hub with the support of Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science & Technology, Gol in 2011.
- 1. **CURRENT PROGRESS:** A basic biotechnology research laboratory with all the essential equipment and facilities has been set up; Hands on training on biotechnology are conducted in the hub for schools and colleges on regular basis; and Consultancy service is given to Senior Secondary Schools with science stream to set up.

- PATENT INFORMATION CENTRE: Set up at the Nagaland Science & Technology Council (NASTEC) to create awareness about IPRs especially patents, GI registration copyright, trademark etc. in the State. Activities taken up are awareness programmes on 'Intellectual Property Rights' conducted in schools and colleges; Awareness talks on "Geographical Indication" to various tribal women society; Patent Search facilities are availed to the public through the Indian Patent database and Ekaswa 'A,' B,' and 'C.'
- RAJIV GANDHI NATIONAL DRINKING WATER MISSION, PHASE -IV: The Council with NRSC, Department of Space, Gol is taking up a project on RGNDWM for the whole State to prepare ground water prospect maps and ground water quality maps using remote sensing and GIS technology.
- WATER REFERRALS LABORATORY: The council has established State Referral Laboratory for water Quality Testing and Monitoring which was inaugurated on 19th April 2016. Under this facility unit, project on Rainwater Harvesting Technology was demonstrated in 6 water scare villages in the State. Currently, a project on Water Quality Mapping for Kohima and Peren is in progress with funding from DST, Gol.

> DEVELOPMENT OF HILL AGRI TOOLS AND EQUIPMENTS

- Collaborative project between Nagaland Science & Technology Council and Facilitation Centre for Industrial Plasma Technologies, Gandhinagram to improvises traditional tools and equipment for better productivity and to develop new ergonomic tools and machineries for animals feed preparation and farm value addition of agricultural crops.
- CURRENT PROGRESS: Tools like dao, knife, spade and feed crusher blade have been nitrided at FCIPT and the testing of the tools is being done. A radical Plasma Nitriding system for cutting is incorporated in the project.
- > CURRENT PROJECTS UNDER REMOTE SENSING & GIS APPLICATIONS
- APPLICATION OF REMOTE SENSING AND GIS IN SERICULTURE DEVELOPMENT-II (CURRENT PHASE): Central Silk Board (CSB) and various State governments launched the national sericulture project.

In the second phase, 3 districts were covered - Kohima, Dimapur and Peren for assessment of suitability of land for sericulture. This project was completed and submitted to CSB.

- 2. NATIONAL WASTELAND CHANGE ANALYSIS: National Wasteland Monitoring Project was carried out under National Resource Census programme which was initiated by Department of Space, Gol Funded by Ministry of Rural Development. Main goal of the study is to bring out the spatial changes of various wasteland categories during 2005-06, 2008-09 and 2015-16 for Nagaland. This project is completed and submitted to Gol.
- LAND DEGRADATION MAPPING 2ND CYCLE: Objective of this project is to map and monitor the land degradation on 1:50,000 scale and to have a baseline information and to identify the different types of land degradation.
- 4. LAND USE LAND COVER MONITORING PROJECT (LULC): Carried out on 1:50,000 scale by a NASTEC under National Resource Census project in collaboration with Department of Space, Gol. Primary objective of the study is to monitor and analyse land use change for 2005-2006 and update the land use changes for 2011-2012 and 2015-16 using the previous data as the base layer. The maping is being repeated after every 5 years under the Natural Resources Census. This project is completed and submitted to the Gol.
- 5. INTEGRATED WATERSHED MONITORING PROJECT (IWMP): The project envisages monitoring and evaluation of IWMP projects using Bhuvan web services and mobile app for the sanctioned projects from 2009-10 to 2014-15. Each project has to be monitored for 5 years from the date of implementation using high resolution satellite data.
- CHEMICAL ECOLOGY PROGRAMME OF THE NORTH-EASTERN REGION (NER) OF INDIA: A collaborative programme linking NER and Bangalore Scientists. Launched on 19th April 2016 at NASTEC, Kohima. Currently 3 projects taken up, namely Chemical Ecology of Oak Borer Larva with its host and the associated organisms; Chemical Ecology of Dazo Nha: A potent anti-rheumatic plant; and Aquariumassisted Evaluation of Fish-Poisoning Plants against Fishes followed by Piscicidal Plants Extraction, Isolation and their Neurobiological Activity.

NAGALAND STATE CLIMATE CHANGE CENTRE: Established in April 2017. The cell was set up under the National Mission for Sustaining the Himalayan Ecosystem (NMSHE). The Cell will focus on issues underlined and prioritized in the Nagaland State Action Plan for Climate Change (SAPCC).

• STATE PLAN PROGRAMME

> FARMERS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME:

- To be implemented in the rural areas of the State with a project cost of Rs. 559 lakh to be implemented for 3 years (2017-18 to 2019-20), funded under Negotiated Loan from NABARD. It envisages to bring 300 acres of silkworm host plant cultivation with a target to produce 3.00 MT of Eri Cocoon per annum.
- 2. During 2018-19, 160 acres covered under the project and Rs. 100 lakh provided for its implementation.

> COMMON FACILITY CENTRE

- 1. Envisage to establish Common Facility Centres at centrally located areas, and proposed to create infrastructure consisting of Spinning Halls and Weaving Halls etc.
- Project cost of Rs. 516 lakh to be funded under the Negotiated Loan. Accordingly NABARD sanctioned the project amounting to Rs. 447 lakh, to be implemented during 2018-19 to 2019-20. Proposed to be established at Phek, Mokokchung and Wokha.
- 3. Rs. 100 lakh is provided under the Negotiated Loan during 2018-19.
- EXHIBITION & PUBLICITY: Organized its first Silk Fashion Show under the banner "Naga Silk Show 2018" at Naga Heritage, Kohima exclusively on silk products to showcase the various products and the rich designs and motifs of the State.
- MARKET DEVELOPMENT: The Department has been assisting the producers by channelizing the market to outside and inside the State through various exhibitions, expos, and melas. To encourage the

sericulture farmers of the State, floor prices of various silk products are adopted and is being revised from time to time.

- CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES
- RASHTRIYA KRISHI VIKAS YOJANA (RKVY): Silkworm Seed Grainages are being established in various districts for commercial seed productions. Adopted Eri Seed Rearers (AESR) are also promoted to establish linkages for assured supply of quality Seed Cocoons to the commercial Seed Production Centres. Activities implemented during 2018-19 are established 1 Commercial Eri Seed Grainage at Sericulture Farm, Tuensang; 20 Eri Farmers adopted for Eri Seed Rearers; Skill upgradation training imparted to all the farmers covered under the project; Rearing kits and equipments required supplied; and under the Sub-Tribal Plan (STP) component, 15 farmers brought under silkworm host plant cultivation in Kiphire.
- INTEGRATED ERI SILK DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS (IESDP): Centrally Sponsored Scheme under the North Eastern Regional Textile Promotion Scheme (NERTPS) to cover exclusively women for sustainability livelihood and women empowerment. 1000 women beneficiaries covered for plantation, rearing, seed production, spinning and weaving activities. ACHIEVEMENT MADE DURING THE LAST 2 YEARS:
- 1. 500 beneficiaries provided training on Eri packaging practices and supported with components such as plantation development, establishment of rearing house, installation of rearing equipments along with capital fund.
- 2. 120 adopted seed rearers selected for rearing of quality seed cocoon.
- 3. 150 beneficiaries selected and trained on weaving and provided with certified looms for value addition.
- 4. 120 vermicompost sheds and irrigation facilities provided at beneficiaries level.
- MEGA SILK EVENT 'SURGING SILK:' The Ministry of Textiles, Gol in coordination with Central Silk Board has organized a one day Mega Silk Event title "Surging Silk" at New Delhi on 9th February 2019 so as to honour the best achievers under identified categories in Sericulture. 5 stakeholders awarded with citation and certificates in different categories.

> INTEGRATED SCHEME FOR DEVELOPMENT OF ERI & OAK TASAR SILK INDUSTRY IN ASPIRATIONAL DISTRICT KIPHIRE:

- 1. The Gol has identified Kiphire district under 'Upliftment of 14 Aspirational Districts of NE States.'
- 2. The State Department in association with Central Silk Board Ministry of Textiles Gol has prepared the project for the following components to cover 700 beneficiaries under the scheme from 2018-19 to 2019-20, namely Raising of Eri food plants; Maintenance of existing perennial Eri food plants; Adopted Eri seed rearers; Adoption of Eri private graineurs, maintenance of existing Oak Tasar plantation; Support for motorized reeling-cum-twisting machine; and support for motorised spinning machine and support for certified handlooms.

> SERICULTURE PROJECTS UNDER NEC:

- 1. Implementing Sericulture project in the State NEC funding with a project cost of Rs. 488.60 lakh covering 400 acres of land for cultivation of Eri silkworm food plant in 4 districts viz. Mon, Mokokchung, Dimapur and Zunheboto.
- 2. The project could be completed only during 2018-19 with the release of Rs. 215.50 lakh being the last and final instalment of Central Share. Major activities covered under the project are development of host plant nursery, raising of host plant cultivation, construction of rearing shed and grainages, rearing of silkworm for production of cocoons, strengthening of infrastructure for silkworm, seed production, and training programmes for skill upgradation, exposure trips to outside the State etc.

SOCIAL WELFARE

1. DIRECTORATE OF SOCIAL WELFARE

CHILD WELFARE PROGRAMMES

ANGANWADI SERVICES: Erstwhile Integrated Child Development Services Scheme (ICDS). Beneficiaries are children in the age group of 0-6 years, pregnant women and lactating mothers. 9 district ICDS Cells and 60 ICDS projects operating in the State, covering more than 3.50 lakh beneficiaries under 3,980 Anganwadi Centres.

- SUPPLEMENTARY NUTRITION PROGRAMME: Funded jointly by the Central and State Government on 90:10 basis. Various supplementary nutrition items such as micronutrient fortified khichiri, kheer and weaning food are distributed to around 3.50 lakh targeted beneficiaries in 3,980 Anganwadi Centres, under 60 ICDS Projects located across the State.
- ANGANWADI WORKERS TRAINING CENTRE (AWTC): Completed 110 Job Training courses and 72 Refresher courses for Anganwadi Workers and 18 Orientation Training for Anganwadi Helpers. So far 3,850 AWWs imparted Job Training Course, 2,880 AWWs imparted Refresher Training Course and 900 AWHs imparted Orientation Course.
- NAGALAND BAL BHAVAN: Set up at the Tribal Welfare Complex, Kohima on 7th November 2008. It aims at enhancing creativity among children in the age group of 10 to 16 years, where various activities of children on science, literacy, creative arts, painting, integrated activities, performing arts and physical activities will be provided in due course of times.
- SCHEMES FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS (SAG): During 2011-12, the Gol introduced Scheme for Adolescent Girls, (out of school), from 11 years to 18 years of age which was covering only 3 districts. It is extended to all the remaining districts covering 7,320 adolescent girls in the age group of 11 to 14 years and has been renamed as SAG.
- PRADHAN MANTRI MANTRU VANDANA YOJANA (PMMVY): The erstwhile Indira Gandhi Matritva Sahyog Yojana (IGMSY) now known as the (PMMVY) was launched in 2017. Implemented in Nagaland from 2018 onwards, to improve the health and nutrition status of pregnant women and lactating mothers (PW & LM) and infants.

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- NATIONAL NUTRITION MISSION-RASHTRIYA POSHAN ABHIYAN: Launched on 8th March 2018. Holistic nourishment to strengthen and harmonise action for nutrition and to reduce the nutrition evidence gap in India. Poshan Abhiyan is to ensure convergence of all nutrition related schemes of the Ministry of Women & Child Development (MWCD) on the target population.
- NATIONAL CRECHE SCHEME FOR CHILDREN OF WORKING MOTHERS: Aim of providing quality day-care services, improve nutrition and health status of children, to promote holistic development of children from 6 months up to 6 years of age for children of working mothers in rural and urban areas and to educate and empower parents/caregivers for better childcare. Number of children in the creche should not be more than 25, and of these, at least 40% of children preferably should be below 3 years of age.
- WELFARE PROGRAMMES
- NATIONAL SOCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAMME (NSAP): Funded by the Ministry of Rural Development and the Department of Social Welfare implements the following 3 schemes:
- INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL PENSION SCHEME (IGNOAPS): Senior citizens, 60-79 years of age given monthly pension of Rs. 200 per month; Senior citizens, 80 years and above given a monthly pension of Rs. 500 per month; State Government provides Rs. 100 per month to each beneficiary as state contribution towards the IGNOAPS.
- 2. INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL WIDOW PENSION SCHEME (IGNWPS): Deserving BPL widows of 40-59 years are provided with pension at Rs. 300 per month.
- 3. INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL DISABILITY PENSION SCHEME (IGNDPS): Deserving BPL persons with multiple disabilities from 18 -59 years of age are provided with pension of Rs. 300 per month.

- 4. NATIONAL FAMILY BENEFIT SCHEME: In the event of death (natural or accidental) of the primary bread earner of families living below the poverty line, the bereaved families are assisted with one time financial assistance of Rs. 20,000/
- WELFARE PROGRAMME FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES
- INDIRA GANDHI NATIONAL DISABILITY PENSION SCHEME (IGNDPS): Launched during February, 2009.
- 1. **ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA** BPL persons with severe and multiple disabilities; 18-59 years of age; Medical Certification from Medical Board (80%); and Dwarfs will also be an eligible category for this pension. 1,276 disabled persons availing the pension under the scheme at Rs. 300 per month.
- ASSISTANCE TO DISABLED PERSONS FOR PURCHASE AND FITTING OF AIDS/APPLIANCE (ADIP): Around 407 beneficiaries provided aid and appliance covering the various districts with Cherry Blossom, NAPAD and Yankee-Multi Purpose Welfare Societies as implementing agencies.
- NATIONAL E-SCHOLARSHIP: Implemented by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities through the National e-Scholarship Portal which will provide scholarship for students with disabilities. 5 categories of scholarship implemented for students with disabilities are Pre Matric Scholarship for Class IX and X; Post Matric Scholarship for Class XI to Post Graduation; Scholarship for Post Graduate degree or diploma in 197 notified institutions; National Overseas Scholarship for students with disabilities for pursuing master's level courses and Ph. D abroad; and National Fellowship for PwDs is a fellowship scheme for pursuing Phil./PhD courses in any university recognized by UGC.
- DISTRICT DISABILITY REHABILITATION CENTRE (DDRC): Established in Dimapur and is under Supervision of Medical Superintendent, District Hospital, Dimapur. DDRC in Mon and Tuensang in the process of establishment with the sanction of the Ministry of Social Sciences & Empowerment.

'NIRMAYA HEALTH INSURANCE SCHEME FOR THE WELFARE OF PERSONS WITH AUTISM, CEREBRAL PALSY, MENTAL RETARDATION AND MULTIPLE DISABILITIES: To provide affordable health insurance to such persons and to encourage health services seeking behaviors among persons with developmental disability.

> UNIQUE DISABILITY ID (UDID)

- 1. Creating a national database for PwDs.

- 1. FAMILY COUNSELING CENTRE (FCC): 2 voluntary organizations accorded sanction for running FCC in Dimapur and Mokokchung.
- VOLUNTARY ACTION BUREAU (VAB): To assist the board in dealing with the cases of atrocities and the exploitation on women and children.
- > CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEME (CSS)
- 1. NATIONAL MINORITIES DEVELOPMENT & FINANCE CORPORATION: To promote micro-finance support for women SHGs all over Nagaland. 470 beneficiaries under micro-finance during 2018-19 and marketing exhibition (yearly event) for 40 SHGs from different villages was held during Hornbill Festival 2018 with exhibition and sales of SHG products.
- 2. - 4. UJJAWALA: Scheme for prevention of trafficking and rescue, rehabilitation and re-integration of victim for commercial sexual exploitation. Ongoing Ujjawalla in Nagaland School of Social Work, Dimapur.
- 5. SWADHAR GREH: To provide temporary accommodation maintenance and rehabilitative services to women and girls rendered homeless due to family discord, crime, violence, mental stress, social ostracism or are being forced into prostitution and are in moral danger. NGOs implementing Short Stay Home-Prodicals Home, Dimapur.
- 6. - STATE RESOURCE CENTRE FOR WOMEN (SRCW) (2018-19)
- BETI BACHAO BETI PADHAO: A Centrally Sponsored Scheme, it was launched on 13th October 2015. At the district level, BBBP was first implemented in the Gender Critical District Longleng.
- MAHILA SHAKTI KENDRA (MSK): Under the umbrella scheme Pradhan Mantri Mahila Shashakti Karan Yojana (PMMSY) of the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Gol, it provide an

interface for rural women to approach the government for availing their entitlements and for empowering them through awareness generation, training and capacity building.

- 3. WOMEN HELPLINE (181): To provide 24 hours immediate and emergency response to women affected by violence through referral and information about women related government scheme programmes through a single uniform number 181 which is integrated with One Stop Centres and was officially launched in the State.
- 4. SAKHI-ONE STOP CENTRE: To provide integrated support and assiatance to women affected by violence, both in private and public spaces under one roof. OSC is currently being implemented in Dimapur and Kohima.
- EMPANELLED INSTITUTE SEXUAL HARASSMENT AT WORKPLACE (PREVENTION, PROHIBITION AND REDRESSAL) ACT 2013: The SRCW- Nagaland Chapter has been empanelled by the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Gol to impart training on it.
- > STATE GOVERNMENT PROGRAMMES
- 1. ADOLESCENT GIRLS CLUB: Was formally launched on 22nd May 2008, to facilitate adolescent girls to emerge as formidable agents, as ambassadors of change in attitudes and systems which will benefit them and society at large. The motto of the club is 'Live the promises.' Presently, it is formed in 7 schools in Kohima, 2 schools in Wokha and 2 schools in Jalukie.
- SOME MAJOR ACTIVITIES OF THE STATE BOARD DURING 2018-19: State level launching of nationwide DISHA Dashboard; Launch of BBBP in Peren and Phek; Distribution of Sanitary Pads; Cases registered under Women Helpline Nagaland (181) during 2018-2019. For April (2018-19), there were 58 critical cases and 73 non-critical cases registered.
- MAHILA SHAKTI KENDRA-DISTRICT LEVEL CENTRE FOR WOMEN LONGLENG: Survey for Girl Child Scholarship; Free medical health checkup and baby show; Street Plays; Signature Campaign, etc. were taken up during 2018-19.

3. INTEGRATED CHILD PROTECTION SCHEME (ICPS)

- THE SERVICE DELIVERY STRUCTURE
- The State Child Protection Society (SCPS) is the implementing agency of ICPS. It monitors and supervises all the programmes under the scheme.
- The State Adoption Resource Agency (SARA) is the nodal agency in the State to coordinate, monitor and develop the adoption programme.
- District Child Protection Units (DCPUs) are set up in all the 11 districts. DCPUs are the fundamental units at the district level for implementation of ICPS.
- **STATUTORY MECHANISMS:** As per the Juvenile Justice Act, the following statutory mechanisms are to be put in place by the State in every district, such as Child Welfare Committee (CWC); Juvenile Justice Board (JJB); and Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU)
- **INSTITUTIONAL CARE:** As per the ICPS norm, adequate provision for creation and maintenance of institutional facilities for the children has been provided. 70 CCI is registered under JJA, of which scheme is supporting 43 Child Care Institution (CCIs). There is atleast one CCI for children in need of care and protection and for children in conflict with law in each district.
- FAMILY BASED NON- INSTITUTIONAL CARE: 4 programmes under family based Non-Institutional Care, namely Adoption, Sponsorship, Aftercare and Foster care.
- **STATE ADOPTION RESOURCE AGENCY (SARA) ACTIVITIES:** Launching programme of the Video and Radio Jingles on Adoption.

4. NAGALAND STATE COMMISSION FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES.

- Was constituted in terms of the provisions of Section 61 & 62 of the Persons with Disabilities Act, 1995 and approved by the State Cabinet dated 01/11/12.
- **DISABILITY STATUS IN NAGALAND:** Population of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) Nagaland according to 2011 Census is 29,631; State disability percentage is 1.5% and National disability percentage is 2.21% and Disability Certificate issued as on January 2015 was 999 persons (3.37%)

FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMISSION: Co-ordinate with departments of State Government for programmes and schemes for the benefit of PwDs; Monitor utilization of funds disbursed by the State Government; Take steps to Safeguard the rights and facilities made available to PwDs; To submit reports to State Government on implementation of the act at intervals so that the Government may prescribe and forward a copy thereof to the office of the Chief Commissioner for PwDs MSJ&E, Department of Empowerment of PwDs, Gol; To look into complaints with respect to matters relating to Deprivation of Rights of PwDs, non-implementation of laws, rules, bye laws, regulation, executive orders, guidelines or instructions made or issued for the appropriate rights of PwDs, and take up the matter with the appropriate authorities.

5. NAGALAND STATE COMMISSION FOR WOMEN (NSCW)

- Was constituted on 30th November 2006 under the Nagaland Women Commission Act 2006 (Act No. 6 of 2006) and was formally inaugurated on 28th March 2007.
- SOME OF THE MAIN ACTIVITIES: The Commission has been engaged mainly with sensitization efforts since its inception such as Women/ Girls Legal Rights under the Constitution; Access to legal authorities for redressal of grievances; Create awareness for a safe environment within the family by discouraging domestic violence in homes and encouraging women to report such cases to the authorities promptly; and Documentation of tradition practices relating to women.
- REGULAR ACTIVITIES
- INSPECTION OF DISTRICT JAILS: In compliance with the directive from the National Commission for Women, dated 19-03-2018, the NSCW visited 10 Districts Jails and 1 Central Jail of the State during their tour from 10th April to 1st May 2018 (District Jail, Longleng is still under construction).
- LEGAL AWARENESS PROGRAMME: Celebrated on the theme 'Know your rights' sponsored by the NCW, New Delhi was organized by NSCW in collaboration with the units of the Tribal Women Hohos in the suburban pockets of Kohima and Dimapur from 9th to 23rd June 2018.

- FORTNIGHT OBSERVATION ON ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN: Observed 16 days of activism on elimination of violence against, which is in pursuance with the United Nations General Assembly adoption of the 'Declaration on the elimination of violence against women' from 25th November to 10th December 2018.
- BUDGET (GRANT-IN-AID) NON-PLAN: During 2018-19, Rs. 50,00,000
 provided.
- 6. <u>NAGALAND STATE COMMISSION FOR PROTECTION OF CHILD</u> <u>RIGHTS (NSCPCR)</u>
- Was constituted under Section 17 of the Commission for Protection of Child Rights Act 2005 and established in 2013
- ACTIVITY REPORT
- A free Health Care Checkup was organized for Langsa Care Home, Lampong Sheanghah at Mon district for 33 children by the Mon BN/7 Sector Assam Rifles with the initiative of the Chairperson.
- The Chairperson and Members of the State Commission attended various programmes conducted by the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights outside the State for proper and effective implementation of Child Rights Act.

STATE COUNCIL OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH & TRAINING (SCERT)

- The SCERT functions at the State level while its fulcrum in the district is the Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS), District Institutes of Education and Training (DIETs). At present, there are 8 functional DIETs in the State, and 3 new DIETs in Peren, Longleng and Kiphire established. 8 new Block Institute of Teacher Education (BITE) at Secü (Kohima), Longkhim (Tuensang), Chuchuyimlang (Mokokchung), Meluri (Phek) Bhandhari (Wokha), Aboi (Mon), Akuluto (Zunheboto) and Medziphema (Dimapur) has been approved.
- BUDGET PROVISION: During 2018-19, Rs. 197.78 lakh was allocated under State Plan, while 995.84 lakh was allocated under Non-Development.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES DURING APRIL 2018-MARCH 2019

- RESEARCH & SURVEY: The Council has declared 2017 as 'Year of Research,' for SCERT and 13 research topics taken up during the period which were officially released on 5th July 2018.
- TEACHERS TRAINING: The contact programme of the 3rd Batch, 2nd year D.El.Ed (ODL) in 8 papers including Practicum and Block Teaching was conducted during the period after which the teacher trainees were sent to their respective schools for the practice teaching.

> TEXT BOOK DEVELOPMENT

- 1. **DIKSHA** (Digital Infrastructure for Knowledge Sharing) is a national digital platform for teachers which offer resources for teaching, learning and professional development. Nagaland is one of the first States in the country to take the initiative towards making the platform fully operational.
- 2. During 2018, steps have been initiated by the council for creation of Energised Textbooks (ETB) which would help both the students and the teachers to understand concepts better through digital resources, equip teachers with digitized teaching methods.
- 3. ETB for Class 5, Social Science and English developed and introduced.
- ENGLISH LANGUAGE TEACHING INSTITUTE (ELTI): Centrally Sponsored Scheme which was introduced in partnership with the English & Foreign Language University, Hyderabad and the Language Division of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Gol to provide quality training on the teaching of English, specially for the secondary level teachers.
- EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE EDUCATION (ECCE): Caters to 0-8 years of age. Activities during 2018-19 includes conducting training in Diploma in Preschool Education (DPSE) for in-service teachers, organizing TLM exhibition, conducting mentor's orientation for practice training.
- VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE: In a first of its kind in the country, the SCERT introduced the 9 months Diploma Course in School Counselling on 16th April 2018. Under this programme, 2 teachers from every Secondary School in the State shall be trained after which they would function as Counselors in their respective schools. The first batch of 26 trainees completed the course in February2019.

- NATIONAL TALENT SEARCH EXAMINATION (NTSE) AND NATIONAL -CUM-MERIT SCHOLARSHIP (NMMS) EXAMINATION (NTSE/ NMMS): Main objective of the NTSE is to identify meritorious students and to nurture their talents while the NMMS is conducted to identify meritorious students, particularly from economically weaker section of the society including the physically challenged and to reduce dropout rate at elementary level. For 2018-19, it was conducted on 3rd November 2018 with 709 students from both Government and Private schools appearing for the exam. 379 students of Government Schools appeared for the NMMS Examination.
- BOARD OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOL EDUCATION (BESE): Issues certificates to students completing the elementary level and assesses and monitors the performance of all students from Class 1-8, through the process of Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE).
- STATE BOARD OF TEACHER EDUCATION (SBTE): To oversee the conduct of various Teacher Training Programmes conducted by the SCERT and the DIETs. During the period, the SBTE has conducted 2 examinations for the 2nd year, D. El. Ed (Regular) and 2 examinations for the 2nd year, D. El. Ed (ODL) programmes, including 2 examinations for repeaters. Also conducted examination for 2nd year D. El. Ed (English) under ELTI and 2 years Diploma in Pre-school Education (DPSE), under ECCE including the 9 months Diploma in School Counselling under Guidance & Counselling.
- > STATE INSTITUTE OF EDUCATIONAL MANAGEMENT & TRAINING (SIEMAT):
- 1. Conducting professional training programme and organizing training programmes on matters pertaining to educational management and planning for educational administrators of the State.
- Conducted one month certificate course on 'School Leadership' during March 2018 for 25 Headmasters and Assistant Headmasters from Kohima, Dimapur, Mokokchung, Peren, Phek and Zunheboto. Based on 'School Leadership Development,' resources developed by National Centre for School Leadership, National University of Educational Planning and Administration (NUEPA), New Delhi.

- SPELLING BEE: 7th Edition of the Nagaland Spelling Bee Championship was organized in partnership with the Fountain Club on 27th and 28th September 2018 with 60 spellers registered for participation; 53 from private schools and 7 from government schools, across the State.
- SCIENCE EXHIBITIONS AND LITERACY ACTIVITIES FOR STUDENTS: Organized the SLEPC INSPIRE MANAK, 2018-19 on 19th December 2018 where 2 children were selected to represent the State at the 7th NLEPC to be held at IIT, New Delhi. 4 children selected in the SLPC held in 2017 to also join the students selected during 2018.

> NAGALAND HERITAGE STUDIES (NHS)

- 1. Introduced NHS from Class 1 to 5 during the Academic Session, 2018, forming the basis for the contents of all MIL textbooks from Class 1 to 8.
- 2. The subject was conceptualized in 2016 and textbooks for Class 1 to 5 was developed in 2017. 2018 saw the continuation of developing the NHS textbooks for Class 6 to 8.
- 3. In January 2019, these books got printed and will be introduced in schools from the Academic Session 2019.
- NATIONAL POPULATION EDUCATION PROJECT (NPEP): Centrally Sponsored Scheme (CSS), implemented under the MHRD, Gol. Activities carried out during 2018-19 includes conduct of state level national role play competition; Translation of adolescence issues into Sumi, Sangtam and Yimchunger dialects; Development of guide book on curricular activities book for teachers; Advocacy programme for EBRC personnel at Kiphire; Advocacy programme for community members at Longthonger village, Kiphire.
- NEW DISTRICT INSTITUTE OF EDUCATION & TRAINING (DIET) AND BLOCK INSTITUTE OF TEACHER EDUCATION (BITE): Ministry of Human Resource Department (MHRD), Gol has approved and sanctioned the establishment of 3 new DIETs at Longleng, Khiphire and Peren, including 8 new BITE at Secü (Kohima), Longkhim (Tuensang), Chuchuyimlang (Mokokchung), Meluri (Phek), Bhandari (Wokha), Aboi (Mon), Akuluto (Zunheboto) and Medziphema (Dimapura). Civil works for the new institutes are underway.
- WORKSHOP AND SEMINARS: 1st All Nagaland Educators Conference was organized on 10th May 2018 at SIEMAT under the theme 'Changing perspectives and changing approaches in Teachers' Education.'

STATE INSTITUTE OF RURAL DEVELOPMENT (SIRD)

- BUDGET DURING 2018-2019: State Plan is Rs. 225 lakh and Non-Plan is Rs. 412.41 lakh
- **TRAINING ACHIEVEMENT DURING 2018-2019:** Conducted 43 outreach training programs, seminars, workshops wherein 1724 persons have been trained.
- RESEARCH PROJECTS ONGOING: The impact of rural livelihood on MGNREGS programmes in Kohima, Dimapur and Phek; Effective use of telecentres to bring government services to the rural communities; Impact of communitization on rural women; Technical quality and economic assessments under MGNREGA with reference to Horticulture; and awareness about work entitlement among workers under MGNREGA in Nagaland.
- PUBLICATIONS, TRANSLATION IN LOCAL DIALECTS, REPRINTING OF PROGRAMMES/GUIDELINES: SAGY Guidelines; Transparency & Accountability-SAU (MGNREGA); Rural Development Programme & Right to Information under Panchayati Raj (in all Naga major dialects); Right to Information (RTI) & National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (NREGS) (in all Naga major dialects); Management of SHGs; Guidelines of MGNREGS; Enabling Digital Payment in rural areas of Nagaland; 101 things you wanted to know about the police, but were too afraid to ask (in all Naga major dialects); and Empowering Village Council through Nagaland Village & Tribal Councils Act, 1978 (in all Naga major dialects).
- STATE TOT ON ENABLING DIGITAL PAYMENT IN RURAL AREAS OF NAGALAND UNDER CASHLESS TRANSACTION PROGRAMME: Conducted the State ToT programmes on 'Enabling Digital Payment in Rural Nagaland under Cashless Transaction Programme' for RD and SIRD officials. This training programme will be imparted in cascading mode where the ToTs will train the District Resource Persons (DRPs), the DRPs will train the Block Resouce Persons (BRPs) and these BRPs will in turn, train the Village Panchayats.
- EXTENSION TRAINING CENTRES (ETCs)

- ETC TUENSANG: Established in 1997. The proposal for creation of posts of ETC Tuensang has been put up to State Government by the SIRD in 2011-12. However, till date it has not materialized. Presently, Principal ETC is attached to Directorate of SIRD due to lack of manpower and infrastructure in ETC, Tuensang.
- 1. ACTIVITIES:
- A. 282 participants benefited through these trainings.
- B. TRAINING PROGRAMME: 12 training programmes scheduled for 1018-19. However only 9 programmes (Local Self Government, its Role and Responsibilities; Grass-root Level Planning and Implementation of Rural Development Programmes; Planning & Implementation of Rural Development Programmes; Training Need Assessment of VCs & VDBs; Health and Nutrition for Women and Children; Poverty Alleviation and Self Employment under SRLM; Drinking Water and Sanitation; Planning and Implementation of MGNREGA; Planning, Implementation, Monitoring & evaluation of PMGAY) could be implemented.
- ETC, PHEK: Has been gradually improving since 2009. During 2018-19, 9 trainings conducted (Income Generating Activities for Rural Women; Planning and Implementation of MGNREGA; Sensitization of Self Help Group; Empowering Women through Skill Upgradation; Grass-root Level Planning and Implementation of Rural Development Programmes; Rural Marketing for Sustainable Development in Rural Areas; Planning and Implementation, Monitoring & Evaluation of RD Programmes; Sustainable Livelihood for Rural Women)
- ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR MARGINALIZED PEOPLE: A Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) was signed with the Department of Justice, Ministry of law & Justice, Gol to implement a project on 'Access to justice for marginalized people' which focuses to address the legal needs of the marginized and vulnerable sections of the society, scheduled castes, tribal communities through training of elected representatives and Panchayati Raj functionaries.
- NRLM: Presently, the institute is imparting training and sensitizing NRLM programmes at various Level of ToTs in the State, the funding of which is directly sponsored by NIRD&PR, Hyderabad and NIRD & PR NERC, Guwahati.

- SPECIFIC INNOVATIVE PROGRAMMES: Setting up Rural Museum is in progress which will depict the technologies of the Nagas and also benefit the trainees.
- SAANSAD ADARSH GRAM YOJANA (SAGY): Rural development programme that aim to instill certain values in the villages and their people so that they get transformed into models for others. Launched on 11th October 2014.
- RASHTRIYA GRAM SWARAJ ABHIYAN (RGSA)
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme that mandates the responsibility of local planning and developmental activities to the Panchayats and envisions people-led development at the grassroot level. Transformation of Aspiration Districts programme aims to quickly and effectively transform selected 117 district across the country, Kiphire being the Aspirational District in Nagaland, is the main focus of development as per the RGSA Guideline.
- SIRD has been empanelled to carry out the capacity building and training activities under RGSA.

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

- The first Polytechnic i.e. Nagaland Polytechnic established in 1972 at Atoizu, Zunheboto renamed as Khelhoshe Polytechnic.
- The State has 6 technical institutes offering 3 years Engineering Diploma programme in Civil, Electrical & Electronics, Mechanical Automobile, Computer Science, Electronic & Communications, Information Technology, Modern Office Practice and an Advanced Diploma Programme in Fashion Design & Apparel Production.
- Wokha, Aboi, Peren, Longleng and Kiphire Government Polytechnic are expected to start the session from 2019-2020.
- STATE COUNCIL FOR TECHNICAL EDUCATION (SCTE): To advise the Government on Formulation of Policy on Technical Education in the State; Forming regulations and conducting examination and award of Diploma/Degree certificates conforming to the standard prescribed by All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE); Review/Development of Curricula; Staff Development; Infrastructure

Development; Appointment of Board/Committee for various academic matters related to Diploma/Engineering college; and Application and recognition of institution conducting courses other than university courses and prescription of such courses of study.

- TOURIST ACCOMMODATION: Efforts to explore the potentials of home stays and rural accommodation. The Government is also promoting the concept of community based Rural Tourism through which local communities can derive benefits and facilitate participation and empowerment of the local people in matters of decision making and management.
- HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT: Annually conducts tourist guide trainings, workshops on Home Stay Orientation, and orientation programme for taxi drivers for the very purpose of enhancing and upgrading the skills of the stakeholders already involved in tourism.

TOURIST TRAVEL CIRCUIT AND TOURIST DESTINATIONS

- As developmental projects under North East Council assisted Projects during 2018 such as:
- 1. Eco-tourism destination and development of trekking route at Phusachodu village, Phek
- 2. Establishment of Enopen Tourist Resort at Khonoma, Kohima.
- 3. Development of Tourist Trekking and Base Camp at Mt. Saramati and Thanamir village of Kiphire.
- 4. Eco-tourism Destination at Sendenyu, Bio-diversity and Wildlife Conservation Area, Kohima.

- The whole stretch of Naga Heritage Village Kisama was declared as 'Plastic Free Zone' including Hornbill Night Bazaar in Kohima city.
- Some of the other events included Peoples Festival at Khezhakeno, Trekking and Hiking of Mount Tyozwu, Dzükou Winter Experience, Traditional Evening Park at Kigwema, Rifle Shooting competition, Nagaland Honey Bee Day, Loom Festival, Folk Tune competition, 1st Hornbill Badminton Tournament, a night celebrating the Naga Female artists etc. Hornbill 2018 also witnessed the performance of Korean Culture Team.
- MINI HORNBILL FESTIVAL: In order to make tourism sustainable, the Government of Nagaland has decided to introduce the Mini Hornbill Festival beginning from 2018 in order to extend the tourist season across the year and to take tourism to all the districts in the State.

FAIRS AND EVENTS

- Participated in the 7th International Tourism Mart (ITM), Agartala from 23rd - 25th November 2018, TTF Kolkata, Paryatan Parv at Delhi.
- Under Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat, Nagaland is in collaboration with Madhya Pradesh for cultural exchange programme where some officials along with Naga Chef and Folk Tune artist participated at Bhopal from 9th - 12th July 2018.
- TOURISM POWER HOUSE A PATA INDIA INITIATIVE: A 2 day inaugural Premier event of the Pacific Asia Travel Association India Chapter was held at the Park, New Delhi on the theme 'Decoding Tourism Today' on the 5th and 6th August 2018.
- DEPARTMENTS INITIATED ACTIVITIES 2018: Dzükou Valley Festival, Go Green Cherry Tree Plantation at Naga Heritage Village, Kisama, Amur Falcon Conservation Week at Wokha, Dzükou Cleanliness drive under the theme 'Let us free Dzükou from garbage.'

PROMOTION AND PUBLICITY

- Printed an updated version of tourism brochures for circulation and use in fairs and festivals for promoting Nagaland Tourism. Soft copy (USB drive and CD) of tourism brochures and promotional video on Nagaland Tourism are produced mainly for use at international fairs and events.
- Advertisements to popular travel magazines and journals are also being issued marketing Nagaland tourism to the outside world.
- Maintains a user friendly website www.tourismnagaland.com which is updated from time to time.
- **PRIVATIZATION AND COMMUNITISATION OF RURAL TOURISM ASSETS:** The Department has leased out 46 buildings/assets which is fully functional and earning good revenue. Tourist Lodge Kohima (Hotel Millennium), Tourist Lodge Mokokchung (Hotel Metsuben) and Tourist Lodge Wokha (Tourist Resort) are privatized to local entrepreneurs and has been functioning satisfactorily till date.
- **IDENTIFICATION OF TOURISM POTENTIAL:** It is almost imperative that the tourism planning of the region should evolve around the concept of sustainable tourism.

- ECOTOURISM: Khonoma, Dzüleke, Dzükou, Mt. Saramati, Green Dikhu project, Benreu, Sendenyu Bio-diversity Conservation are some of the popular eco-tourism spots in Nagaland. The State is also a viable location for promoting Cinematic Tourism in the near future.
- AGROTOURISM: The Apple Festival in Thanamir, Kiphire; Kiwi Farms in Phek district; Pineapple Plantation in Medziphema etc. are some of the few examples that can be promoted under this genre. The Dragon Fruit and other Tropical Fruit Farms in the foothills of Nagaland can also come under this form of tourism.
- ADVENTURE TOURISM: Potential spots for trekking in Nagaland are Dzükou Valley, Dzüleke, Mt. Japfü, Mt. Saramati, etc. Doyang and Tizu are ideal spots for river sports. Paragliding has been recently introduced in Pfutsero of Phek district.
- HERITAGE/CULTURAL TOURISM: Comprising of 16 major tribes along with other sub-tribes, and with each tribe having its own distinct customs, language, attire, traditions etc. makes culture one of our most precious assets. At present, the Department is committed towards promotion of Cultural Tourism in the State.
- WELLNESS TOURISM: The State is located in one of the 25 hotspot regions of the world in terms of bio-diversity with forests covering an area of 13,318 Sq. Km corresponding to 80.33 percent of the State's total geographical area. Nagaland possesses a vast variety of herbal and medicinal plants and this exotic feature creates a great potential for promotion of Wellness Tourism.
- EXPERIENTIAL TOURISM: Experiential Travel also known as 'Immersion Travel' or 'Immersion Experience' is a form of tourism in where people focus on experiencing a country, city or particular place by connecting to its history, people and culture by living it. The development of rural areas and villages can provide an ideal solution for promotion of this form of tourism. Again, several factors like increasing levels of awareness, growing interest in heritage and culture, improved accessibility, and environmental consciousness are shifting the trend towards rural tourism and as such, Nagaland State has a vast potential for developing such form of tourism.

- DARK TOURISM: Dark Tourism involves travelling to sites associated with death and suffering. This includes castles and battle fields. One such tourism can be Commonwealth World War II Cemetery, Kohima.
- The budget provision during 2018-19 under the State Plan was Rs. 1019.60 lakh and under Non-Plan was Rs. 1030.59 lakh.

URBAN DEVELOPMENT

- FLAGSHIP PROGRAMMES
- > ATAL MISSION FOR REJUVENATION & URBAN TRANSFORMATION (AMRUT)
- 1. **PROJECTS UNDER AMRUT:** Water Supply; Sewerage and Septage Management; Storm Water Drainage; Non-motorized Urban Transport; and Green Spaces and Parks. Launched in June 2015 by erstwhile Ministry of MoUD for 5 years. The Ministry has selected Kohima and Dimapur cities under this Mission. Total allocation for the entire period ie. 2015-2020 is Rs. 120.21 crore.
- 2. ONGOING PROJECTS UNDER AMRUT MISSION: Drainage (CRSM) at Lerie, Kohima; Drainage at New Market, Kohima; Drainage below Naga Hospital, Kohima; Drainage below Paramedical, Kohima; Refurbishment of Water Distribution Tank in Dimapur; Construction of Footpath in Dimapur under implementation; and Cess Pool Vehicles: "Sewerage & Septage Management."
- > DEENDAYAL ANTYODAYA YOJANA-NATIONAL LIVELIHOODS MISSION (DAY-NULM)
- 1. Centrally Sponsored Scheme provided by Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs, Gol beginning from 2014-15.
- To reduce poverty and vulnerability of the urban poor households by enabling them to access gainful self-employment and skilled wage employment opportunities, resulting in an appreciable improvement in their livelihoods on a sustainable basis, through building strong grassroots level institution of the poor.
- 3. COMPONENTS UNDER NULM
- A. SOCIAL MOBILIZATION & INSTITUTION DEVELOPMENT (SM&ID): NULM envisages universal social mobilization of urban poor into

Self-Help groups (SHGs) and their federations and lay particular emphasis on the mobilization of vulnerable section of the poor urban population such as SCs, STs, minorities, female-headed household, persons with disabilities, the destitute, migrant laborers, especially vulnerable occupational groups.

- **B. CAPACITY BUILDING AND TRAINING (CB&T):** Trainings and meetings are conducted at state and district level; also under various national level trainings are administered.
- C. EMPLOYMENT THROUGH SKILL TRAINING AND PLACEMENT (EST&P): Provides skill training for urban poor to enable them setting up self-employment ventures and for salaried jobs in the private sector. Different trainings viz. Computer (both software and hardware), Fashion Designing, Cutting and Tailoring, Beauty & wellness and Hair cutting, Nursing, Carpentry etc. are imparted and provides placement opportunity to those who are qualified and eager after the courses are completed. During 2018-19, 1970 candidates trained and certified; 12970 candidates placed till date, out of which candidates are self employed and 400 are wage employed.
- D. SELF EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMME (SEP): Financial assistance provided in the form of bank loan for set up gainful self employment ventures/micro-enterprise, suited to their skills, training, aptitude and local conditions in 3 categories viz, SEP-I (individual), SEP-G (group) and SHG-Bank Linkage. During 2018-19, 88 individual candidates identified and selected for SEP-I and 31 Groups indentified and selected for availing SEP-G while SHG-Bank-linkages are underway.
- E. SUPPORT TO URBAN STREET VENDORS (SUSV): Aims at skilling of street vendors, credit support micro-enterprise development and pro-vending urban planning along with supporting social security options for vulnerable groups such as women, SC/STs and minorities. Ongoing in Phek and Wokha while 947 identified in 3 ULBs, namely Dimapur, Kohima, and Mokochung. Construction is completed in Dimapur, Mokokchung and Phek and ongoing in Wokha.
- F. SCHEME OF SHELTER FOR URBAN HOMELESS (SUH): Aims at providing permanent shelter equipped with essential services to the poorest of the poor of the urban homeless in a phased

manner. Depending upon local conditions, each shelter could cater to between 50 and 100 persons. Identified 49 homeless and construction is completed in Dimapur and ongoing in Mokokchung.

- > 10% LUMPSUM PROVISION FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF NER INCLUDING SIKKIM
- 1. Formulated especially for development of the North Eastern states which are sanctioned through erstwhile Ministry of Urban Development (MoUD) and Ministry of Housing & Poverty Alleviation (MoHUPA).
- 2. Projects under this scheme were selected on priority as per Priority List prepared from the proposals for projects in the 19 Statutory towns of the State recommended by the elected members.
- 3. Till date, 61 projects sanctioned under MoUD and 6 projects under MoHUPA which has been implementing through various departments, out of which 39 projects are completed while others are ongoing. Construction of RCC T Beam Bridge over Dhansiri Dimapur has made commendable progress in the current financial year.
- SWACHH BHARAT MISSION (SBM): Launched on 2nd October 2014 to eradicate manual scavenging, effect behavioral change, municipal solid waste management and overall improvement of the urban environment. 19 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) are covered under SBM

- B. **Community toilets:** 428 at Rs. 26,400 per toilet

- 2. **IMPLEMENTATION STATUS:** As per the ULBs' report status, the achievements are as indicated below:
- A. Conversion/renovation of 9300 new toilet units completed.
- B. 6715 Individual Toilets under programme.
- C. 51 Waste Disposal Machineries are procured and in use.
- D. All the 19 Municipal and Town Councils are declared as 'Open Defecation Free!'

- ASIAN DEVELOPMENT BANK (ADB) ASSISTED NORTH EASTERN REGION URBAN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (NERUDP) PROJECTS: NERUDP is implementing through a special purpose vehicle called State Investment Programme.
- TRANCHE-I AND TRANCHE-II REFURBISHMENT OF KOHIMA WATER SUPPLY: Tranche-I Water Supply Refurbishment comprises of RCC Tanks and Water Treatment Plant at Science College, Jotsoma. Water Treatment Plant completed and commissioned. Tranche-II comprises of water supply network distribution wherein 318 Km of pipeline is laid covering the entire Kohima Municipal Area.
- 2. SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT FACILITY FOR KOHIMA AT LERIE: Consists of a 50 tonnes per day compost plant to process the biodegradable waste, a sanitary landfill to accommodate 42,000 cu.m of waste, a leachate treatment plant of 75,000 litres per day capacity for treating the toxic effluent from the composting process and a landfill, weight bridge, laboratory, garages, high mast lighting, electrical sub-station, firefighters arrangements etc. with development of access road and internal road network.

- > GENDER RESPONSIVE BUDGET

1. TOWARDS GENDER MAINSTREAMING

- A. Census 2011 indicates 52.47 percent female non-workers in the State. In order to engage them in skilled trade for employment, the SEP under NULM is implemented. This programme targets both male and female, however it is mandatory for urban poor household to have at least 1 female member in the SHGs
- B. A financial aided loan up to Rs. 2 lakh for individuals and Rs. 10 lakh for SHG is given for skill trade employment in urban areas.

- 2. TOWARDS GENDER SPECIFIC BUDGETING: Implemented various projects such as construction for market and shopping complexes for the unemployed and poor women.
- 3. WOMEN STREET VENDORS: NULM is a programme to address the following under street vendors components - Survey and issue of identity card; Preparation of city street vending plan; Infrastructure improvement; Training and skill development; Financial inclusion; Access to credit; and Linkage with Social Security Schemes
- > DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY NAGALAND (DAN)/STATE PLANS & NUIS
- 1. Constituted in 1976 and is delivering infrastructure deve,lopment works all over the State and beyond
- Participated in various competitions through bidding in the Contractual Works Department (CPWD) in ICAR projects. Has been expanding its activities for contractual works in Meghalaya and Assam as well.
- Received contract works from Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya (JNV) for building school projects in Nagaland. The National Council of Science Museum (NCSM) has awarded the work for construction of Innovation Hub at Science Centre, Dimapur with a project cost of Rs. 236 crore to Development Authority Hospital Kohima.

4. OTHER STATE PLANS

- A. The Department through the allocation of State Plan Programmes like Neighborhood Development Programme and Urban Infrastructure Development Scheme has been able to cater infrastructure development projects in all the districts.
- B. Presently with the paucity of State Plan Fund in the past 3 years, the Department proposed to implement basis infrastructure requirement of the District Headquarters other than Dimapur and Kohima due to the fact that these 2 cities are covered under CSS programmes like the AMRUT and Smart Cities.
- C. 2 projects are ongoing Construction of Directorate Annexe Building and Construction of Kiphire Office Building
- 5. NATIONAL URBAN INFORMATION SYSTEM (NUIS)

- A. NUIS aims at creation of database for all the urban centres in the country. The programme is one pilot project basis covering 2 township, namely Dimapur and Mokokchung town. The 2nd phase will cover the other 9 township District Headquarters of the State
- B. It is initiated by Ministry of Urban Development for Generation Multiscale Hierarchical Urban Geospatial Database on thematic contents using Satellite, Ariel and GPR Techniques.
- C. NUIS Team for the Department successfully carried out vetting of the 2 town maps at 1:10,000 scales and subsequently carried out vetting of the Municipal Area at 1:2000 Scale in all the wards in consultations with representatives from all wards as well as the District Administration for authentication and validation.

WATER RESOURCES

- **MINOR IRRIGATION:** During 2018-19, the Department submitted detailed project report for 270 M.I schemes at an estimated cost of Rs. 206.85 crore and target to develop 8544.00 ha of CCA for consideration of sanction scheduled to be implemented during 2 years.
- **COMMAND AREA DEVELOPMENT & WATER MANAGEMENT:** Due to the State's inability to fund 50% of the project cost, there is difficulty in effective implementation of the project.
- FLOOD MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME (FMP)
- Centrally Sponsored Scheme for construction of anti-erosion works, drainage and flood mitigation works of critical in nature. Funding pattern has now been changed to 90:10 (CS:SS) under NITI Aayog.
- Ministry of Water Resources, River Development & Ganga Rejuvenation (RD&GR) has recently intimated the MoWR, RD & GR, Brahmaputra Board, Guwahati that 'Flood Management' component and River Management activities and work related to Border Areas (RMBA) is now under the merged scheme of 'Flood Management and Border Areas Programme (FMBAP)'
- 2 new schemes, namely (1) Development of Dimapur Airport Drainage Ph-IV, Dimapur with an estimated cost of Rs. 1007.924 lakh covering

2.733 Km length of protection work and (2) Protection of Tuli town from erosion of Milak River, Ph-II Mokokchung with an estimated cost of Rs.1012.195 lakh covering 2.63 Km length of protection work have been recommended by State Technical Advisory Committee (STAC).

Further 2 other schemes, (1) Anti-erosion work for protection of Kughovi, Toluvi, Henivi, Shezukhu and Zukihe village areas from erosion of Chathe River in Dimapur and (2) Anti-erosion work for protection of Kushiabill, Imkongsenden and Domokhia village areas from erosion of Dhansiri River in Dimapur are under proposal for approval of STAC.

- Conduct census of Minor Irrigation works on quinquennial basis. This scheme is 100% central assistance provided by the Centre to the State.
- Successfully completed 5 Census with the reference year 1986-87, 1993-94, 2000-01, 2006-07 and 2013-14.
- The 6th M.I Census with reference year of 2017-18 has kickstarted with an estimated cost of Rs. 63.36 lakh.

- Central Sector Scheme of 8 years duration starting from 2016-17 onwards with an objective to modernize the data, information and knowledge support for water resources management, planning and operation.

WOMEN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

MYKI FEST

- Initiated as an annual event to celebrate the activities and achievements of women entrepreneurs, artisans, artistes, cultivators and Self Help Groups (SHGs) aligned with the Department.
- The Department organized the first ever Myki Fest 25th & 26th October 2018 at Kohima. Display and sale of fresh local fruits and vegetables, traditional and modern Naga Jewellery, apparels and accessories, home furnishings; fast food etc. formed the core of the event. 12 women entrepreneurs and 30 SHGs from across the State participated.
- DIRECT BENEFICIARY TRANSFER (DBT) TO BENEFICIARIES UNDER FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO DESTITUTE WOMEN SCHEME
- The Department provides financial assistance to destitute women who are widowed, unmarried, or abandoned and falls in the age between 35-60 years
- Rs. 2400 is provided to each beneficiary at Rs. 200 per month.
- Successfully linked approximately 80 percent of the 4165 beneficiaries to the Nagaland State Cooperative Bank Ltd. for Direct Beneficiary Transfer
- INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT-CUM-RESOURCE CENTRE (IDRC),

DIMAPUR

- The IDRC at Purana Bazaar, Dimapur is presently being manned by 3 women entrepreneurs with whom the Department entered into MoU during 2016-17, namely, PreciousMeLove, Quirky Qrafts and Rolong's Creations, which receives funds by the Department for implementation of their activities, apart from their own activities in production and marketing of their own.
- Products, funds are provided to them for implementing free training programmes to school dropout girls and other needy young women in the trades of Soft Doll Making, Paper Crafting and Cutting and Tailoring.
- WOMEN ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT FUND
- The Department is implementing 3 categories of womenentrepreneur centric loan programmes, which are interest-free and revolving in nature, namely:
- 1. PROMOTION OF WOMEN IN INNOVATIVE ENTERPRISE (PWIEP)
- A. It targets upcoming innovative women entrepreneurs who are already in established enterprise and in need of funds to further expand and develop their existing enterprise
- B. An amount ranging from Rs. 2.50 lakh to Rs. 5 lakh is provided to each selected beneficiary
- C. So far, 80 entrepreneurs covered under this programme.
- 2. WOMEN ENTREPRENEURIAL DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE (WEDI)
- A. It targets women entrepreneurs who want to start new or are already in established enterprise. An amount of Rs. 1 lakh is provided to each selected beneficiary
- B. So far, 120 entrepreneurs covered from all districts.
- 3. MICRO ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT SCHEME (MEDS)
- A. It targets women from rural areas to enable them to start microenterprise, be it a small shop, door-to-door sales, vendorship etc.
- B. An amount ranging from Rs. 10,000 to Rs. 30,000 is provided to each beneficiary according to their needs.
- C. Altogether, 240 women benefited from this scheme.
- TRAINING-CUM-PRODUCTION CENTRE (TCPC), KOHIMA
- Provides skill development programmes in the trades of Cutting & Tailoring, Weaving and Knitting for a period of 10 months to school

dropouts girls.

- During 2018-19, training was provided to 40 trainees at the Kohima Centre
- TCPC Dimapur Centre was established under Non-Plan and inaugurated on 23rd May 2018 and the programme kickstarted with 25 trainees.

• WOMEN RESOURCE CENTRES (WRC)

- The Department has constructed Women Resource Centres at Mokokchung and Chazouba (Phek district) and 3 more are under construction in Zunheboto, Wokha and Peren districts.
- During 2018-19, WRC at Chazouba was inaugurated which would now provide various short duration vocational training programmes catering to the needs of rural women during 2019-20. WRC Mokokchung is also expected to be functional the same year.
- GRANT-IN-AID TO NGOs: The Department provides financial aid in the form of grants to NGOs who are genuinely working in the field of socio-economic upliftment of women. GIA is also provided to the Department's partner NGOs at the district and sub-divisional levels for implementing, monitoring and supervising departmental activities at the grassroot level.
- EXHIBITION, WORKSHOP AND TALK SERIES ON NAGA ORNAMENTS: In collaboration with the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA), North East Regional Centre, the Department conducted an exhibition and workshop, academic discourses and lecture series on Naga ornaments and a display of photographic collections from the culture archives of IGNCA at Kisama, during the Hornbill Festival from 1st - 10th December 2018.

TRANSFORMATIVE LIVELIHOOD INTERVENTION (TLI) PROJECT

- Started in 2006, TLI is a comprehensive programme for the socioeconomic empowerment of women, particularly the rural and urban poor women and the marginalized, by facilitating various income generating to enable better and alternative means of livelihood.
- ACTIVITIES TAKEN UP DURING 2018-19 INCLUDES SELF HELP GROUP PROGRAMME
- 1. With the formation of over 1250 SHGs covering approximately 17,000 women households since inception, the SHGs have been networked into Village Units and TLI Divisional Societies across the State.

- 2. The number of active SHGs has declined over the years owing to various factors, the most prominent reasons being faulty group dynamics and lack of perseverance and vision
- 3. Since the last few years, efforts have been made to revive the SHG institution through undertaking intensive tours to the districts by Directorate Officials and Districts Officers, to meet with the groups and village elders and to identify their problems and resolve them.
- 4. FOLLOWING PROGRAMMES WERE EVOLVED BASED ON THE FINDINGS OF THE TOURS:
- A. LIVELIHOOD ENHANCEMENT THROUGH DEVELOPMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES (LEDNR)
 - i. Was initiated based on the soil conditions and the topographic and climatic peculiarity of specific areas in the State.
 - ii. Notable activities taken up were apiculture in Kohima, Pisiculture in Phek, Frog Farming in Peren, Kholar cultivation in Kiphire and Groundnut Cultivation in Wokha.
 - iii. Community Groundnut Farming: 50 women farmers selected from Tsungiki Village/ Chukitong, Wokha and engaged in this nutritional benefit project. Approximately 5000 Kg harvested, and around 200 Kg marketed by the farmers themselves,
- B. CURCUMIN EXTRACTION PROGRAMME (CEP): Initiated during 2016-17 in Jalukie Area
 - i. This programme aims large-scale turmeric cultivation for curcumin extraction. Presently, 300 acres of land are under turmeric cultivation with intercropping of local tree tomato and with involvement of 178 farmers.
 - ii. The first batch of turmeric has been harvested during April 2018, and sold in the raw form after sorting and grading to identified exporters at Rs. 10 per Kg by the farmers.
 - iii. Samples of the present harvested turmeric sent to several laboratories in Kolkata, Pune, Hyderabad and in SASRD, NU (Medziphema) and results have shown that the curcumin content ranged between 5.5% with those from more hilly regions showing higher curcumin content.
 - iv. Establishment of Curcumin Processing Plant in Jalukie town and procurement of turmeric drier and boiler are underway
- C. FRUIT & VEGETABLES PROCESSING CENTRES

- i. Initiated 2 Mini Fruit and Vegetable Centres at Meriema and Rusoma.
- ii. A processing centre was set up and handed over to the Genial Society to run and manage the activities during 2009-10. Similarly, another centre was established at Rusoma during 2015-16 and being managed by group of trained women entrepreneurs.
- iii. During 2018-19, the Department upgraded the Centre at Rusoma.

D. BACKYARD PIGGERY FARMING PROGRAMME

- i. Initiated during 2017-18 keeping in mind the need to increase meat production within the State and decrease import from other States. As such, 112 women beneficiaries identified and selected and provided with piglets, pig feed and medicines in Rusoma, Thekrejuna, Keyake (BSF Camp, Kohima), and A.G Colony/Lerie Kohima with a production outcome of approximately 1570 piglets.
- ii. In 2018-19, 80 women beneficiaries identified and selected and provided with piglets, pig feet and medicines at Tseminyu and Ghukiye village and Shoixe village under Zunheboto. The outcome of the production will be available by the next financial year.
- E. APPARELS & ACCESSORIES PRODUCTION PROGRAMME: An extension of the erstwhile Textile & Weaving Development Project of the Department, and the following activities are being carried out continuously over the year
 - i. Development of new Naga themed motifs designs
 - ii. Printing of cloth material sourced from the market using the new motifs and designs
 - iii. Production of a variety of apparels and other accessories
 - iv. Promotion and marketing of finished products
 - v. Maintenance of machineries and equipments.
